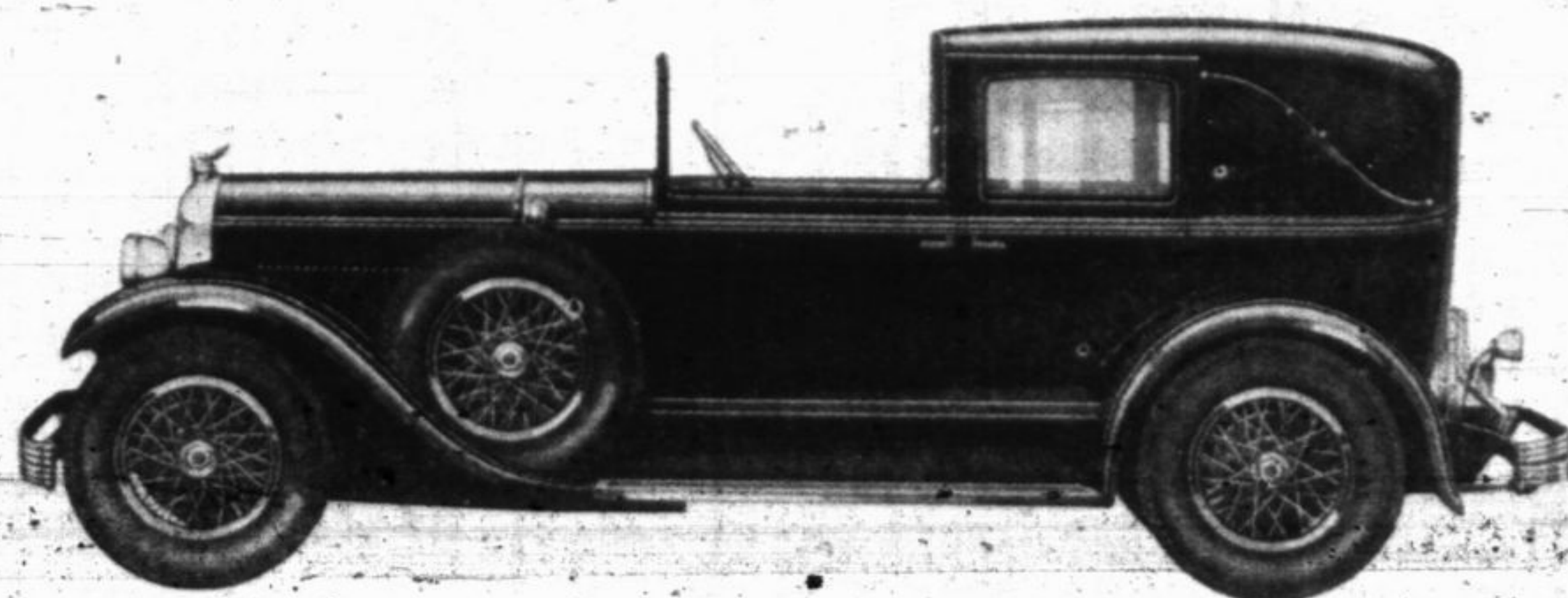
In place of the monthly dinner, the Ladies' Aid will give a "musical" on Friday evening, June 7, and ask their friends to keep this date open for them.
