

MEASURE TO LICENSE AUTO DRIVERS KILLED

House Puts Kibosh on Bill to Make All Car Operators Take Examination

The automobile drivers' license bill was consigned to the legislative junk-heap following its defeat last week by the house after lengthy debate in which Cook county representatives generally fought for its enactment while the downstate opposed. The vote was 69 ayes (11 short of a con-

Rep. David I. Swanson, Chicago, led the forces favoring passage of the measure. Reps. Schnackenberg, Chicago, and Little, Champaign, also urged enactment, claiming it would rid the hard roads of the careless driver.

Lyons Speaks for Bill

Rep. Richard J. Lyons, Mundelein, also spoke for the bill. Making his initial speech of the session, the Lake county representative declared the measure "a step in the right direction."

"If the bill saves only one human life," Rep. Lyons said, "it is worth the effort to bring about its passage. I for one downstate member want to go on record for the bill, believing that its district enforcement will in time bring about the cancellation of a number of drivers who have no regard for the pedestrian. In my judgment this class of drivers should have their licenses revoked."

Opposition to the bill was led by Reps. Rice, Lewistown; Roe, Vandavia, and Borders, East St. Louis. Rep. Rice declared that accidents in Illinois were fewer than in any other state and that the bill's passage would invite another brand of snoopers. He declared that an amendment to the motor vehicle act would secure the results sought under this measure.

Declares It Dead

When it became apparent that the bill was going down to defeat, Rep. Swanson endeavored to postpone further consideration but his motion failed and the speaker declared the bill dead.

The bill first provided for a drivers license fee and for a strict examination supervised by the secretary of state. In this form it barely squeezed through the senate but after reaching the house was sent to a sub-committee where it was rewritten and altered so badly that only the number and title of the original bill remained.

Many newspapers in the state opposed passage of the bill, terming it "needless legislation."

Others Killed

Rep. Chynoweth's bill placing dry cleaners of the state under the jurisdiction of the department of trade and commerce and providing for a \$10 license fee also went to the junk heap when the house by a vote of 77-25 adopted Rep. O'Grady's motion to strike out the enacting clause.

Similar efforts to kill Rep. Burns' bill making county treasurers ex-officio treasurers of school districts, and Rep. Rennick's bill giving cities under commission form of government authority to select newspapers other than dailies as their official organ, failed.
