DEERFIELD A. C. TO MEET NILES CENTER

The Deerfield baseball team will lock horns with Niles Center's fast aggregation next Sunday afternoon on the home field at Jewett Park. Deerfield has been playing a snappy brand of ball and deserves the wholehearted support of local fans.

For several months Deerfield Post, American Legion, has been sponsoring boxing bouts—and they have proven extremely popular. For the summer season, however, these bouts are being discontinued.

BIG TEN TRACK AND FIELD MEET

Veteran athletes of proven caliber will battle for honors in the Western Conference track and field games to be held at Dyche Stadium, Northwestern University, Friday and Saturday.

Eleven of last year's 15 champions will be back again, while a number of newcomers have demonstrated their worth to contend for championship honors.

George Simpson, Ohio State sprint flash, winner of both the 100 and 220-yard dashes last year, is an outstanding favorite to repeat in his specialty, judging from the performance he has turned in this spring. He will encounter his major competition from such performers as Tolan, Michigan; Timm, Illinois; Larson, Wisconsin; Root, Chicago, and Gordon, Indiana.

A great battle will ensue in the quarter-mile race, in which Rut Walter of Northwestern, the defending champion, will attempt to stave off such seasoned runners as Virgil Gist, Chicago; George Baird, Iowa; Ted Catlin, Minnesota; Fred Strother, Ohio, and James Abromson, Indiana.

Hal White of Illinois, last year's winner of the half-mile run, will encounter plenty of trouble if Coach Merriam should elect to send Gist to the mark in this event. The latter is the national intercollegiate champion in the 880.

The mile race appears to be pretty much the property of Orvan Martin of Purdue, who won it last year in easy fashion. His 4:15.6 mile race at the Penn relays marks him as one of the best men America has in this event.

A number of other creditable milers will be in the running Saturday and they include Stine, Illinois; Hoe, Wisconsin; Fields and Banks, Indiana; Lotts and Williams, Chicago, and McCammon, Iowa.

Dave Abbott, the defending champion in the two-mile and a member of the Olympic team last summer, will encounter plenty of opposition, but appears to be the class of the field nevertheless. He will be pushed by such men as Wuerfel, Michigan; Everingham, Iowa; Field, Indiana, and Dillooy of Wisconsin.

The field events likewise have star performers who will stage considerable opposition. Pete Rasmus, twice victor in the discus, will be back to win his specialty for the third and last time. He is conceded a good chance to break the existing Big Ten record held by Mucks of Wisconsin at 155 feet 2 inches.

Wilford Ketz of Michigan, who broke the record in the hammer throw last year, will be back again. His mark of 161 feet 7 7/8 inches will be endangered again since he has been equaling or bettering this mark in the spring events.

Carr of Illinois and Fry of Chicago, who tied for the high jump last year, will endeavor to decide the supremacy Saturday.
