The old Library Board met and ratified the transfer to the new Library association. Dr. Walter B. Metcalf, president of the old Library Board, made a very nice presentation talk. He outlined the progress the Library had made starting with practically nothing, mentioning the different contributors and emphasized the generosity of the Deerfield Chamber of Commerce. He brought out what an important factor the Library had become in the community development and stated that the circulation at present was about 1000 books per month.

In comparison with older libraries and larger communities, our circulation far exceeds any of them.

The new directors are; Richard W. Farmer, president; Harry Wing, vice-president; C. M. Christensen, secretary; W. A. Wood, treasurer; H. M. Hanson, W. W. Geary, directors.

In his talk, Dr. Metcalf paid high tribute to the work done by Mrs. Russo and Mrs. Woolf. The time that these ladies have put in the Library has been very large. Dr. Metcalf also thanked the many other ladies who have helped in the work afternoons and evenings.

The new board held a meeting at once and appointed Mrs. Frank Russo consulting librarian and Mrs. Chester Woolf, librarian in charge of the Library. Other duties are going to take up so much of Mrs. Russo's time that she will not be able to give as much of her time to the Library, so in order not to lose the advantage of her advice, the board created position of consulting librarian and appointed her for this office.

Mr. Farmer, the new president, thanked Mr. Metcalf and asked for the continued support of the ladies, as has been given in the past.
