The petition from property owners on North Green Bay road requesting the city council to designate Green Bay road from Central avenue north to the city limits as a boulevard was referred to Commissioner Brown.

Commissioner Reay presented the following bills and moved that vouchers be drawn in payment of same:

Frederick Hodgdon, architectural fees in connection with the new city hall building, \$3,000.

Taylor, Miller, Busch & Boyden, legal fees in connection with grade separation, \$669.17. The motion prevailed.

The report of Herman Schwery, justice of the peace, showing collection of fines to May 1, 1929 in the amount of \$281.00 was ordered placed on file.

Storm Sewer Ordinance

Commissioner Reay moved the passage of an ordinance recommended by the board of local improvements, construction of a connected system of storm drains in Taylor avenue. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Zimmer moved that the property owners' petition for the division of special assessments levied against the south 100 feet north 500 feet west of east 170 feet west of Sheridan road SW 1/4 SW 1/4 sec. 31,

43, 13, under warrants 271, 273 and 300 be accepted and at the corporation counsel be instructed to present said petition to the county court for approval. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Reay moved the passage of an ordinance amending sec 1, 5, 6, 15, 18 and 19 of Article II, Chapter 3, of Highland Park Code, and adding sec 20, 21 and 22 to said Article II." The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Zimmer moved that Xavier Vigeant be allowed a payment of \$1,922.22 according to the architect's certificate under the terms of his contract for the construction of a fire station building in Ravinia. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Reay moved that the concrete cement sidewalk on the south side of Taylor avenue in front of Lots 26, 27, 29, 31, 32, 33, 34, 37, 38 and 40 in J. S. Hovland's 2nd addition be awarded to Dan McNeil in accordance with his bid submitted to the council on April 29 1929. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Brown moved that change order No. 2 on the Ravinia fire station contract as recommended by the architects be approved. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Reay moved that an ordinance providing for the construction of a concrete cement sidewalk on the south side of Walker avenue between St. Johns avenue and Ft. Sheridan avenue be placed on file for public inspection complete in form for one week before its final passage. The motion prevailed.

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BOWDEN FUNERAL IS HELD LAST MONDAY

Masonic lodge escorted the remains to the North Shore cemetery, where they had charge of the ceremonies, and where interment took place. The pall bearers were William J. Obee, Fred Obee, W. E. Cummings, George Tucker, Fred Tucker and Harry Clow. On May 17, 1928, while confined to his home by illness, Mr. Bowden gave his son, George Bowden the list of old friends and business associates whom he wished to bear him to his last resting place when his time should come, and when his death occurred May 16, 1929, his son remembered his instructions and carried out his wishes.

Death Was Sudden

Mr. Bowden's death was very sudden. He had been in poor health for several years, but last Thursday he seemed better than usual. He was sitting at his desk in his home. Apparently he felt coming on the heart attack which caused his death, as he rose and tried to reach another chair. Before he had accomplished his purpose the end came.

James Bowden was born Nov. 14, 1854, in England. He came to Chicago shortly after the great fire of 1871 and the following year he settled in Highland Park, which was thenceforth his home. About six years ago he made a trip to England to revisit his boyhood home for the first time in more than half a century.

The Family

He was married 48 years ago, in Libertyville, to Miss Ellen Moran, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Moran, pioneer residents of that village. Mrs. Bowden survives, and also

one son, George Bowden. Two sons and one daughter, William, James and Susanna are dead. There are two grandchildren, George and James Bowden. Two sisters of Mr. Bowden also are living, Mrs. Eliza Wakeham, who for several years has made her home with Mr. and Mrs. Bowden, and Mrs. Emily King who lives in England. Five brothers and two sisters are dead.

Notable Masonic Record

Mr. Bowden was the oldest charter member of A. O. Fay lodge, A. F. and A. M., living in Highland Park at the time of his death. There is one older charter member, Harry Obee, who lives in Alhambra, Calif. Mr. Bowden received the Fellowcraft degree Sept. 2, 1878, and the Master Mason degree Sept. 16, 1878. For 25 years he served the lodge as tiler, and in 1899 he was made a life member because of his faithfulness and splendid record. He was also a member of the North American Union.

For about 35 years Mr. Bowden was engaged in the meat business in Highland Park, retiring only a year ago, when his son purchased his in-

terest in the business. During all of his life here Mr. Bowden held the esteem of all who knew him and by his close friends he was greatly beloved for his many splendid qualities. His kindness and fellow feeling for all were notable and his services to his fellow citizens were exceptional. As a Mason, his fellow members testify, his life was a shining example of the spirit of fraternity. Mr. Bowden was a member of the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce and that body was well represented at the funeral. He was held in high regard by all his business associates and throughout the city he was everywhere well known and by all esteemed.

The family have the deep sympathy of their many friends at this time.

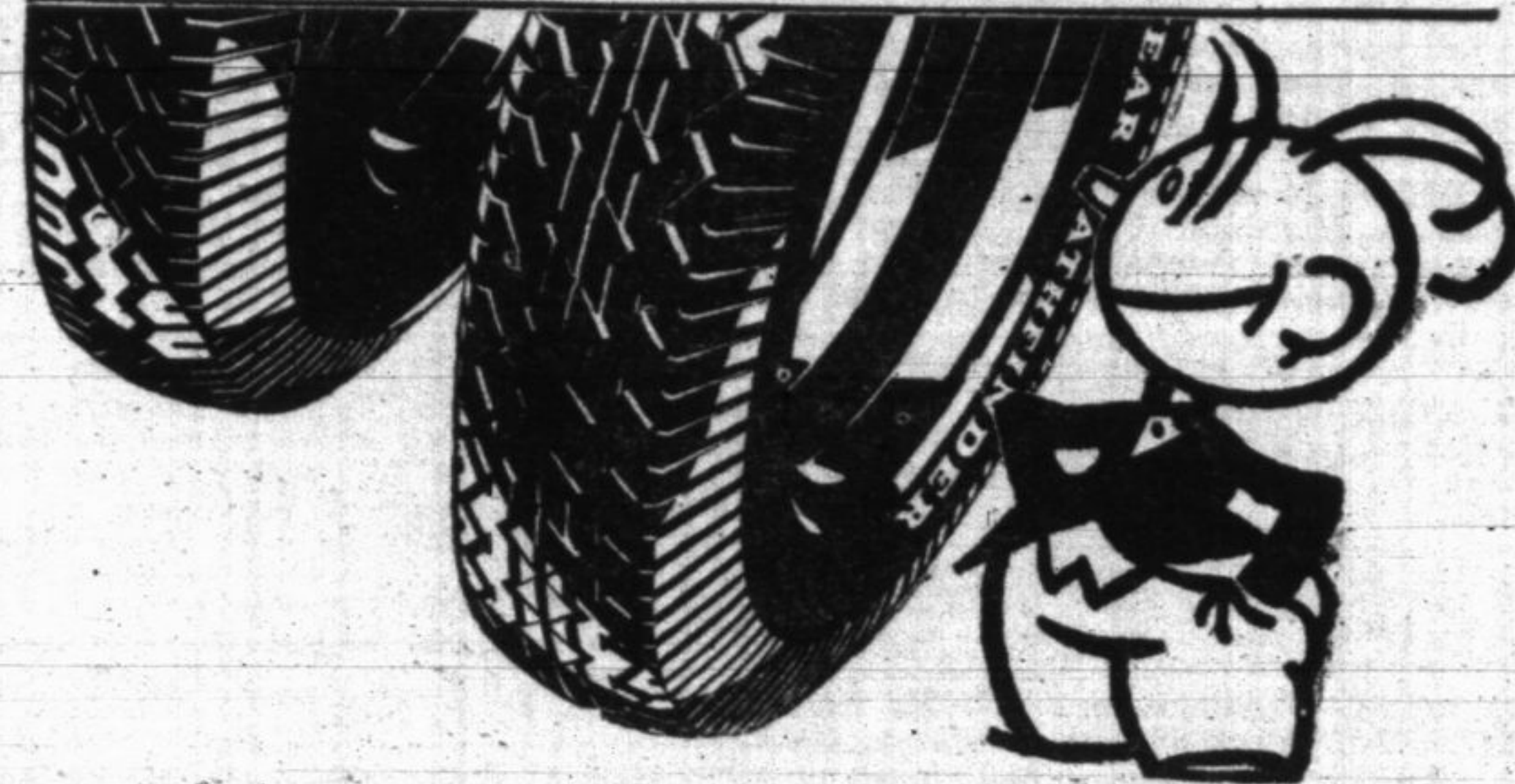
Mr. and Mrs. Burr A. Leisenring spent a few days this week in Indianapolis where they went on business.
