PREDICTS RETURN OF LOCUSTS THIS YEAR

Illinois Entomologist Says In- sect Is Due in State; No Serious Damage

This will be a locust year in Illinois but it will not be followed by famine and suffering such as was the case following locust years of Biblical times, W. P. Flint, chief entomologist of the Illinois State Natural History Survey, has reported to the college of agriculture, University of Illinois. The 17-year locust, or cicada, which is due for the first time in the state as it feeds only to a limited extent on the sap of the succulent growth of various trees, he said.

The insect will appear above the ground for a few weeks starting about the last of May and continuing until a little after the middle of June, according to Flint.

What little damage the 17-year locust, or cicada, does is caused largely by the female. She lays her eggs in slits cut by her sharp ovipositor on the under sides of the leaves. This often causes considerable breaking of the twig tips and a consequent wilting and dying of bunches of leaves on this broken tip. Occasionally in orchards this damage is sufficient to cause some loss. It makes shade trees unsightly for one or two months, but results in very little permanent damage. The 17-year locust does not feed on any of the grain crops and is not injurious in any way except for its injury to trees.
