Many people have told me that they do not care for bananas cooked in any way and I have felt the same

certain combinations which make them very delicious.

One of these combinations I am giving you this week and I hope you will try it, for I think you will like it very much. In this recipe I use tart apples and orange juice with the bananas and this seems to bring out the very best flavor of the bananas.

This may be served either hot or cold. Serve with whipped cream, if you wish and, if you want something a little extra, prepare a little plain moussee and freeze it in the freezing unit of your ice box to serve instead of the whipped cream.

Scalloped Apples and Bananas

- 4 large tart apples
- 3 large bananas
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3 tablespoons butter
- Juice of one orange

Peel and slice the apples and place half of them in a greased baking dish, place over the apples half of the bananas sliced and sprinkle over this half of the sugar and cinnamon mixed together a dot with half of the butter.

Over this place the rest of the apples and bananas, sprinkle with the remainder of the sugar and cinnamon, and the other half of the butter. Pour over this the orange juice. Do not strain the orange juice, but use the bits of pulp also. Bake about one hour at 375.

Plain Frozen Mousse

- 1/2 pint whipping cream
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons white corn syrup
- A few grains of salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Whip the cream until thick, add the other ingredients, place in the freezing unit of your ice box and leave for at least three hours.
