

NOTICE OF AWARDED CONTRACT
 NOTICE is hereby given to all persons interested, that bids for the furnishing of all labor, tools and materials necessary for the construction of a connected system of sanitary sewers, with necessary manholes, septic tank, in Ridge Road, Ridgelee Road, Old Briar Road, Balsam Road, Poplar Road, Blossom Court, and other streets, in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, and the creation of a sewer district therein, were opened on the 20th day of May, A. D. 1929, and the Highways Construction Company, being the lowest responsible bidder, the contract was awarded to the said Highways Construction Company, on the 27th day of May, A. D. 1929.

Said bid for the work is as follows:
 All of the following six (6) items, marked No. 1, No. 2, No. 3, No. 4, No. 5, and No. 6, shall be vitrified, salt-glazed hub and spigot tile pipe sewers, laid with joints of oakum three-quarters (3/4) of an inch in depth.

ITEM NO. 1
 597 lineal feet of fifteen (15) inch tile pipe sewer; the maximum depth of the flow line is thirteen and three-tenths (13.3) feet, the minimum depth is nine and seven-tenths (9.7) feet, and the average depth is eleven and five-tenths (11.5) feet below the existing surface of the ground, including connections to manholes, laid complete at Two Dollars Ninety Cents (\$2.90) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 2
 476 lineal feet of twelve (12) inch tile pipe sewer; the maximum depth of the flow line is sixteen (16) feet, the minimum depth is ten and eight-tenths (10.8) feet, and the average depth is thirteen (13) feet below the existing surface of the ground; including connections to manholes; laid complete at Two Dollars forty-three Cents (\$2.43) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 3
 1156 lineal feet of ten (10) inch tile pipe sewer; the maximum depth is nine and six-tenths (9.6) feet, and the average depth is fourteen (14) feet below the existing surface of the ground; including connections to manholes; laid complete at Two Dollars Thirty Cents (\$2.30) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 4
 5277 lineal feet of eight (8) inch tile pipe sewer; the maximum depth of the flow line is sixteen and seven-tenths (16.7) feet, the minimum depth is eight and four-tenths (8.4) feet, and the average depth is thirteen (13) feet below the existing surface of the ground; including connections to manholes; laid complete at One Dollar Fifty-five Cents (\$1.55) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 5
 5372 lineal feet of eight (8) inch tile pipe sewer; the maximum depth of the flow line is eleven and eight-tenths (11.8) feet, the minimum depth is four (4) feet, and the average depth is nine (9) feet below the existing surface of the ground; including connections to manholes; laid complete at One Dollar Thirty-five Cents (\$1.35) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 6
 260 lineal feet of ten (10) inch tile pipe sewer; the maximum depth of the flow line is ten and four-tenths (10.4) feet, the minimum depth is eight (8) feet, and the average depth is nine (9) feet below the existing surface of the ground; including connections to manholes; laid complete at Two Dollars Eight Cents (\$2.08) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 7
 65 concrete manholes; the bottoms and walls shall be six (6) inches thick, the bottom shall be constructed of monolithic concrete, the walls shall be constructed of concrete segmental blocks; the inside diameter shall be four (4) feet; the average depth of the manholes is eleven and five-tenths (11.5) feet; each manhole shall be furnished with a cast iron manhole cover and with galvanized iron ladder rounds; constructed complete at One Hundred Fifteen Dollars No Cents (\$115.00) each

 30 lineal feet of six (6) inch internal diameter vitrified, salt-glazed, hub and spigot tile pipe drop connection, incased in concrete six (6) inches thick; including six (6) eight (8) inch by six (6) inch tees and six (6) six (6) inch by ninety (90) degree bends; both tees and bends shall be vitrified, salt-glazed; including necessary excavating, backfilling with earth, laid complete at One Dollar No Cents (\$1.00) per lineal foot

 308 eight (8) inch by six (6) inch Y's, complete in place at One Dollar-Ten Cents (\$1.10) each

ITEM NO. 13
 1 special concrete manhole; inside diameter four feet eight inches (4'-8"); the bottom shall be six (6) inches thick, and constructed of monolithic concrete; the wall shall be six (6) inches thick, constructed of concrete segmental blocks. The depth of the manhole is eleven (11) feet. The manhole shall be provided with a cast iron manhole cover, round galvanized iron ladder rounds; constructed complete at One Hundred Twenty Dollars No Cents (\$120.00)

ITEM NO. 14
 1227 lineal feet of forty-eight (48) inch internal diameter reinforced concrete pipe, with tongue and groove joints, laid with open joints; the maximum depth of the flow line is fifteen and four-tenths (15.4) feet, the minimum depth is six (6) feet, and the average depth is thirteen (13) feet below the surface of the ground; laid complete at Eleven Dollars Fifty Cents (\$11.50) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 15
 75 lineal feet of forty-eight (48) inch internal diameter reinforced concrete pipe with tongue and groove joints; laid with open joints at an average depth of the flow line of fifteen and four-tenths (15.4) feet below the top of the ties, laid IN TUNNEL under the Chicago North Shore & Milwaukee R. R. Co. tracks; laid complete at Twenty Dollars No Cents (\$20.00) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 16
 95 lineal feet of forty-eight (48) inch internal diameter reinforced concrete pipe (Massey type or its equal), to be constructed from Manhole No. 27 across the right-of-way of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Co. in Clavey Road, except under the tracks, laid at an average depth of the flow line of fourteen (14) feet below the surface of the ground, laid with open joints, complete at Eighteen Dollars Fifty Cents (\$18.50) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 17
 25 lineal feet of forty-eight (48) inch internal diameter reinforced concrete pipe (Massey type or its equal) to be constructed under the tracks of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Co.'s tracks in Clavey Road; laid IN TUNNEL at an average depth of the flow line of fifteen and five-tenths (15.5) feet below the top of the ties; laid complete at Twenty-one Dollars No Cents (\$21.00) per lineal foot

ITEM NO. 18
 1 headwall constructed of concrete. Said headwall shall be provided with an opening for a forty-eight (48) inch inside diameter concrete pipe. Said wall contains four and one-half (4 1/2) cubic yards of concrete; constructed complete at Twenty Dollars No Cents (\$20.00) per cubic yard

 1 septic tank constructed of three (3) inch Hemlock planks, with one (1) clean-out and one (1) inspection manhole, constructed of

two (2) inch Hemlock planks; the inside dimensions are twenty (20) feet by nine (9) feet; and including eighteen (18) feet of eight (8) inch inside diameter vitrified salt-glazed, tile pipe sewer, and four (4) forty-five (45) degree bends and connection of said eight (8) inch pipe to special manhole; constructed complete at Four Hundred Seventy-five Dollars No Cents (\$475.00)

 3 Special concrete manholes, inside diameter four feet eight inches (4'-8"); the bottoms shall be six (6) inches thick, and constructed of monolithic concrete; the walls shall be six (6) inches thick, and constructed of concrete segmental blocks. The average depth of the manholes is twelve and six-tenths (12.6) feet; Each manhole shall be furnished with a cast iron manhole cover and with galvanized iron

 40 cubic yards of gravel or crushed limestone to be used under and around the forty-eight (48) inch pipe between the head wall and the septic tank; complete in place at Three Dollars No Cents (\$3.00) per cubic yard

 320 lineal feet of open ditch from said headwall east in Clavey Road, complete at No Dollars Fifty Cents (\$0.50) per lineal foot

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reflection of the interests and enthusiasms of her husband. She was active in club work of a wide scope and shared her husband's interest in and frequently his trips to Tuskegee institute, of which he is a trustee.

Her philanthropies included the establishment of a fund to provide day nurseries for colored children.

Girl Scout Leader

Her chief interest, however, was the Girl Scout movement, which had her assistance and co-operation over a period of years. In this organization she was honorary commissioner for Chicago and Cook county. She was also a National vice-president of the Girl Scouts.

Two years ago Mrs. Rosenwald underwent two operations from the effects of which she had apparently recovered, and the news of her last illness was received here much concern. Every summer her beautiful garden at her home here was one of her chief interests, and friends here remember with what pride she always showed them its delights and the great interest she always had in the garden movement everywhere.

Mrs. Rosenwald always maintained a deep interest in her husband's many philanthropies. In 1918 occurred one of the outstanding events of her life, when she and her husband received a golden cup, made in England, in recognition of their contribution of a million dollars to the Jewish War relief fund. The cup was presented on behalf of the members of the American Relief committee, the Central Relief committee and the People's Relief committee and the Joint Distribution committee of the Jewish Welfare board.
