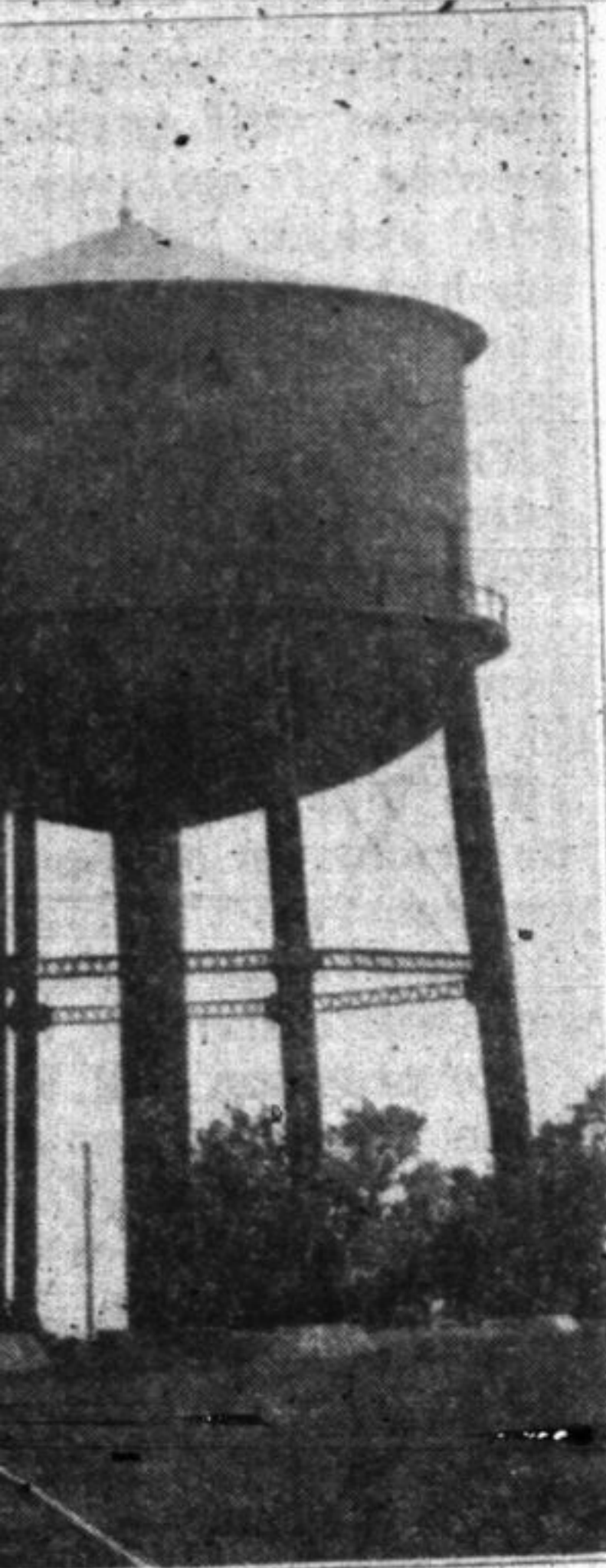


WATER TANK TO 500,000 GALS.

Work on the site of the new water tank for the city waterworks at Sunset is being pushed forward rapidly and it is expected that it will be ready for completion in six weeks. The ornamental structure which is to enclose the tank is not yet finished then, but the tank is ready for filling with water.
