The weather man apparently thought one good day for the golfers was enough at a time, so changed the brand of weather for Saturday and Sunday, and although a supply of earmuffs and overshoes have been ordered for the comfort of the patrons, they were delayed as the supply house was out of stock, however 200 registered to play on Sunday.

Sunset Valley had its share of the trouble but has recovered.

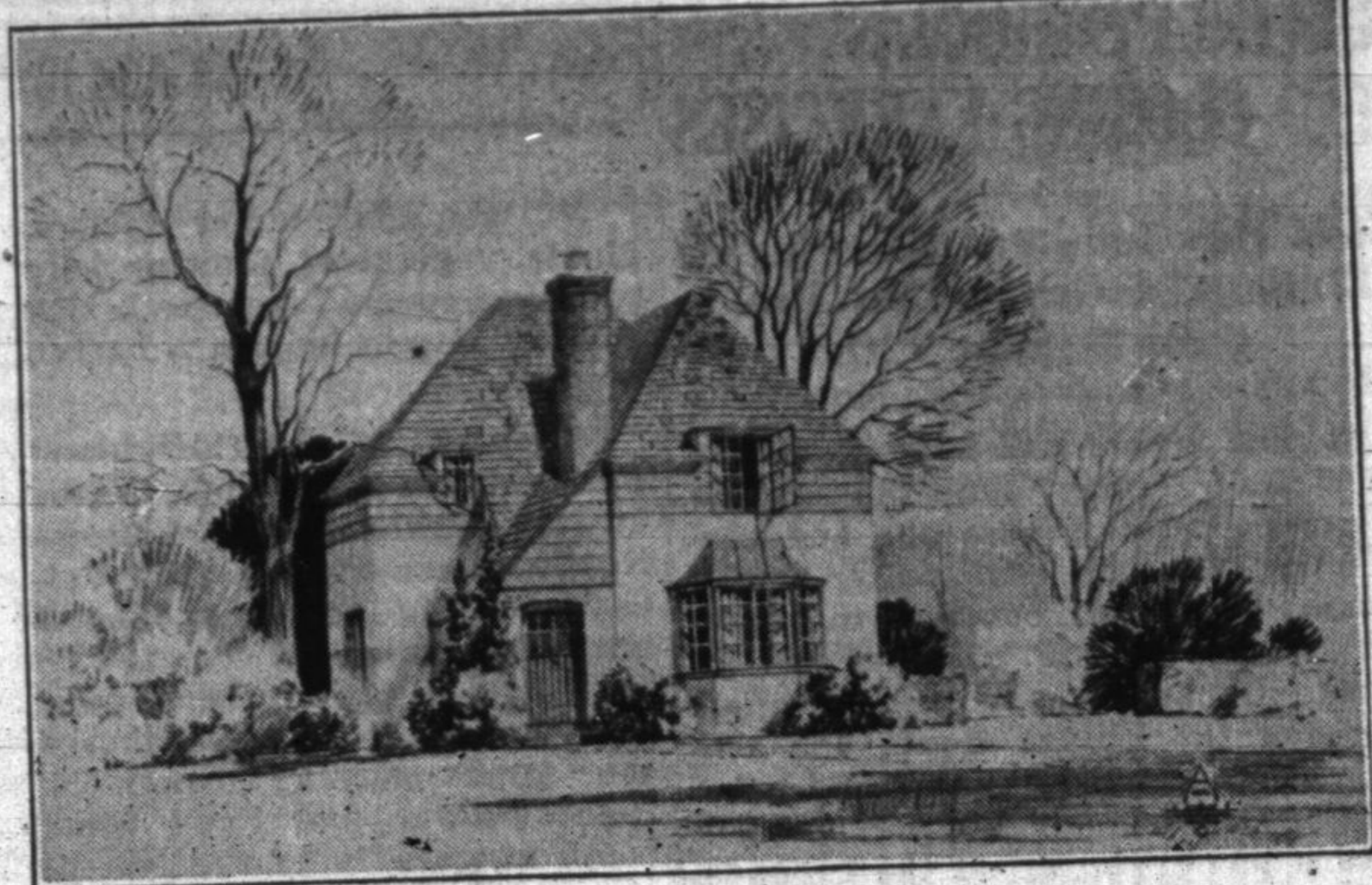

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## House Built by Boys on Vocational Dept. Open on June 8 and 9

Boys of the Building Trades department of the Deerfield-Shields high school are putting on the finishing touches of the house which they have erected at 682 Yale lane, and which will be thrown open for public inspection Saturday and Sunday, June 8-9.

The house is of modern American architecture with a touch of the Old English. The exterior is of red pressed brick and a gray stucco, with a limestone entryway.

From the arched doorway that leads into the living room with its attractive fireplace to the sun porch that gives such a delightful view of the Skokie Valley, the first floor of the house is finished with such imagination and good workmanship by the boys that it arouses enthusiasm of the visitors.

The second floor, with its three bedrooms and three baths, shows the same good planning and workmanship that is characteristic of the rest of the house. The bedrooms and

baths are finished in harmonizing colors and fixtures, and have an abundance of windows and clothes closets.

The floors of all the rooms on this floor, as well as the first floor, except the bathrooms, are of hardwood. The baths have rubber-tile floors, and the walls are tiled up for about four feet.

The basement, with its sports room, large enough for games, billiards, or a den, finished in rough plaster and rough hewn beams, with a large fireplace in the corner, will capture the attention of the men.

The house has been constructed under the direction of Mr. Durbahn of the Building Trades department of the high school, the other members of which consist of Mr. Davitt and Miss Beckmire who teach the boys vocational mathematics, science, and English when they are not out on the job.

The most convenient way to reach the house, which is in the Sunset subdivision, is to go west on Park avenue to Sunset road, one block south on Sunset road to Yale lane, and then one-half block west.

There will be signs directing visitors from both north and south to the house.
