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BOARD GETS BIDS ON ALLEY IMPROVEMENT

Paving and Storm Water Drains in Alley in Block 5; City Council Meets

Bids were received by the board of local improvements, at the regular meeting of the city council and the board Monday night, for the construction of storm water drains in the alley in Block 5, original town, and certain places in the watershed of block 5, and also for paving the same alley, from Laurel avenue, extended, to the north edge of Walnut avenue.

Bids Received

Bids for the storm water drains were: E. A. Meyer Construction Co., \$6,582.55; Highways Construction Co., \$6,554.55; James Viti & Son, \$6,690.60. For the paving contracts the bids were: E. A. Meyers Construction Co., \$5,385.00; Highways Construction Co., \$5,300.00.

On motion, the bids in each instance were ordered placed on file for public inspection, according to law.

After the meeting of the board of local improvements, the council reconvened, the following members being present: Mayor Lewis, Commissioners Brown, Gourley and Zimmerman.

Commissioner Zimmerman moved that X. Vigeant, contractor, for the construction of the Ravinia Fire Station be allowed a payment of \$2,614.59 in accordance with the architect's certificate therefor. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Gourley moved the passage of an ordinance amending section 474, Article XI, Chapter XVII of the Highland Park code of 1929. The motion prevailed.

The matter of recodification of the Highland Park building ordinances was referred to the council of architects for their recommendation.
