TWO DEERFIELD MEN ACCIDENT VICTIMS

Lewis Oberrauch Found Dead Tuesday; Wm. Schreiner Killed Saturday

Lewis Oberrauch, 38, conductor of a filling station at Waukegan and County Line roads, and a resident of Deerfield, was found dead in his Ford car alongside Waukegan road about 2 o'clock Tuesday morning. A fracture of the skull, a broken jaw and a bad cut in the neck, evidently from broken glass, were the wounds described at the inquest held about 11 o'clock Tuesday at the office of the H. M. Prior Co. There were indications that car had struck a tree, after wobbling off and on the road, indicating that the driver may have fallen asleep.

The verdict returned was that the man "came to his death from injuries received when the automobile he was driving left the road and struck a tree; we find that the accident occurred about 100 feet south of Hazel avenue, on Waukegan road, during the night of June 10, or early morn-

ing of June 11. It was brought out at the inquest of the local Fire Department and the that Oberrauch had closed his station about 10 o'clock and drove north to visit another station where some tires were for sale. The operator at that station reported that the man had left there for home. He was not seen again, as far as known, until his body was found, and indications were that he had been dead some

There are living the widow and two daughters, Elsie, 20, and Clara, 12. The elder testified at the inquest as to the time her father closed the filing station and left.

Another Found Dead William F. Schreiner, 60 years old, of Deerfield was found dead in a ditch along the Dundee road near Northbrook Saturday night, the victim, it is believed, of an automobile accident.
