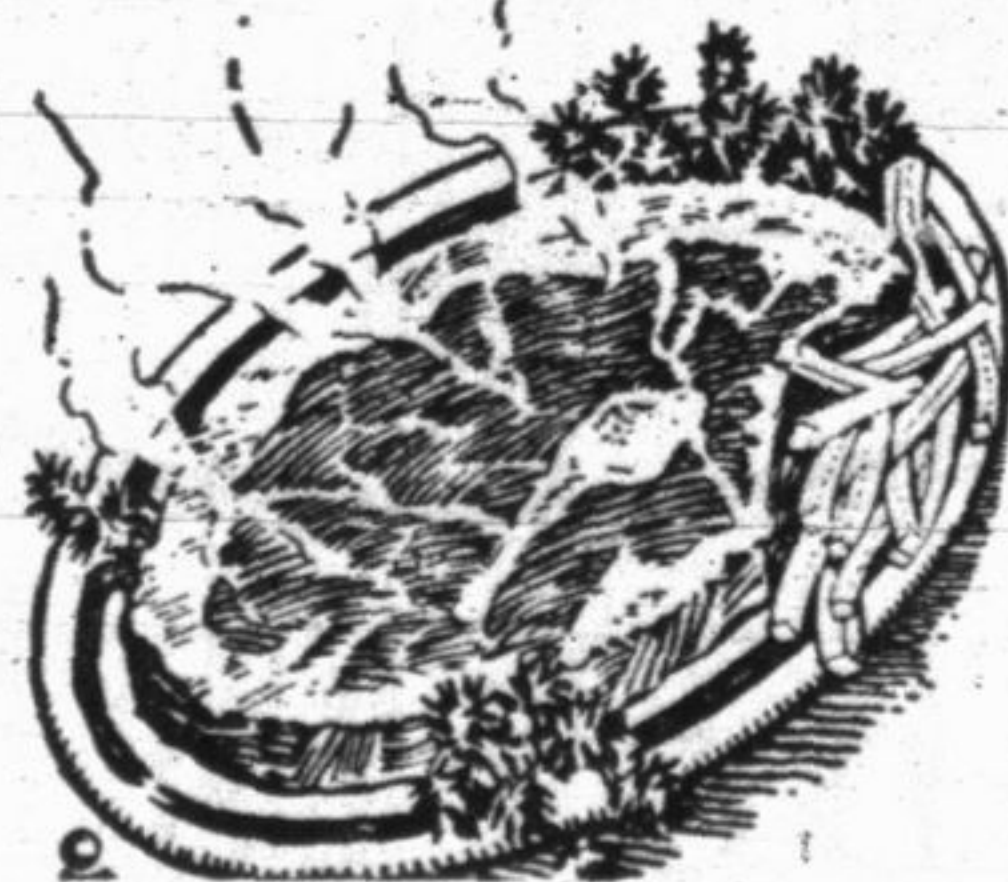

### Hints for the Home

Have you ever thought of the varied uses to which you might put your odd pieces of sterling silver, aside from their customary service?

Salt cellars of the open type make charming clip or stamp holders for the desk.

A sandwich tray—that is, a round one—can be used as an ice cream dish, a dessert dish, for salads or for fruit. And this is likewise true of the berry bowl which is used these days for vegetables, salads, ice creams and many other foods.

Coasters of the old English design with beading across the top can be put to excellent use as ash trays. That is, of course, when not holding their proper decanters. These are just a few of the many ways in which to get double service from sterling which, to yield fullest returns on its investment, should be used every day of its life.

#### One Day's Food

It is said for the average man doing fairly muscular work the day's food supply should contain: 1 1/4 lbs. bread or its equivalent in cereals; 2 oz. butter or other fat; 2 oz. sugar; 1 1/4 lbs. fresh fruit and green vegetables; 12 oz. of food from the meat or meat-substitute class, such as meat, poultry, eggs, fish, milk and dried beans, peas, lentils, etc.

#### Home-Made Furniture Polish

One of the best polishes known can be made by combining 3 parts-olive oil or sweet oil with 1 part vinegar. 3 parts linseed oil and 1 part turpentine also makes a good polish.

This is the season when we begin to think of cold or iced food for our luncheons, and oftentimes for our Sunday evening supper, or even a dinner, as the warm days arrive.

My recipe this time is for Chicken in Aspic Jelly, and is a very delicious food. It is also convenient, for it may be prepared several hours before you are ready to use it, or even the day before, if you wish.

If you have enough left-over chicken, it may be used with some of the broth, or, if not, select a chicken weighing from three and one half to four pounds, cut up and cook slowly until tender, using a little onion and two or three stalks of celery cut in small pieces, for flavor.

When tender, remove skin and bones and cut in pieces not less than three-quarters of an inch, as you will want good pieces of chicken. Strain the broth and proceed as below, using larger quantities, if you wish, but the same proportions.

#### Chicken in Aspic

2 tablespoons plain gelatine  
1/2 cup cold chicken broth, strained  
1 cup boiling chicken broth, strained  
2 cups chicken cut in pieces  
A few stuffed olives and pieces of pimento  
Soak gelatine five minutes in the

cold chicken broth, add boiling broth and stir until dissolved. Chill until it begins to thicken.

Place a thin layer of this mixture in the bottom of a mold and press a few slices of stuffed olive and strips or stars of pimento into it to form any design you wish.

Then add chicken, with layer of the gelatine mixture between layers of the chicken, having gelatine on top. Place in ice box for at least three hours, or longer if more convenient.

When ready to serve, turn out on a serving dish bordered with lettuce hearts, with mayonnaise in the lettuce cups and a dash of paprika on the mayonnaise.

This is very attractive if molded in a ring mold and, when turned out on serving dish, the center or ring filled with a delicious fruit salad.

### No Premium on Indian Head Pennies

The Chicago World's Fair is not offering and does not intend to offer any premium on Indian head pennies, it has just been announced by Homer J. Buckley, chairman of the centennial celebration's committee on public information.

Mr. Buckley's announcement was made as the result of scores of inquiries received at the Chicago Association of Commerce and World's Fair headquarters from men, women and children in all parts of the country who were anxious to know the amount of the premium the fair intended to pay for the pennies, the date of the coins desired and the number of them needed.

No one seems to know who started the rumor that the world's fair was in the market for Indian head pennies, but investigation brought out the fact that coin dealers have been besieged by persons desirous of disposing of their copper coins, and banks have been put to a great deal of inconvenience by persons who have been asking for pennies in large amounts.
