Franz Lipp Contributes Open Air Shakespearean Theatre & Forest Chapel


Franz Lipp of N. St. Johns avenue, recently exhibited a plan for a Shakespearean theatre, a study of open air theatre for classic plays (2 mounts) and a plan for a Forest chapel (2 mounts) at an exhibition held under fruit. And this is likewise true of the direction of the Chicago Architectural Exhibition league in co-operation with the Arts club of Chicago: The exhibition was held May 24 to June 13 in-the galleries of the Arts club, Chicago.

Salt cellars of the open type make charming clip or stamp holders for the desk.

#### Home-Made Furniture Polish

One of the best polishes known can be made by combining 3 parts-olive oil or sweet oil with 1 part vinegar. 3 parts linseed oil and 1 part turpentine also makes a good polish.

This is the season when we begin to think of cold or iced food for our luncheons, and oftentimes for our Sunday evening supper, or even dinner, as the warm days arrive,

My recipe this time is for Chicken in Aspic Jelly, and is a very delicious food. It is also convenient, for it may be prepared several hours before you are ready to use it, or even the day before, if you wish.

If you have enough left-over chicken, it may be used with some of the broth, or, if not, select a chicken weighing from three and one half to four pounds, cut up and cook slowly until tender, using a little onion and field Park Land & Im Assn. two or three stalks of celery cut in small pieces, for flavor.

When tender, remove skin and bones and cut in pieces not less than three-quarters of an inch, as you will field. want good pieces of chicken. Strain the broth and proceed as below, using larger quantities, if you wish, but the same proportions.

Chicken in Aspic

2 tablespoons plain gelatine 1/2 cup cold chicken broth, strained Hovlands 1st addn to Highland Park. 1 cup boiling chicken broth, strained 2 cups chicken cut in pieces

A few stuffed olives and pieces of pimento

cold chicken broth, add boiling broth and stir until dissolved. Chill until it begins to thicken.

Place a thin layer of this mixture in the bottom of a mold and press a few slices of stuffed olive and strips or stars of pimento into it to form any design you wish.

Then add chicken, with layer of the gelatine mixture between layers of the chicken, having gelatine on top. Place in ice box for at least three hours, or longer if more convenient.

When ready to serve, turn out on a serving dish bordered with lettuce hearts, with mayonnaise in the lettuce cups and a dash of paprika on the mayonnaise.
