RAILROAD OBJECTS TO LOCAL TAX LEVY

Northwestern Also Protests Tax Imposed in Other Dis-tricts of County

The Chicago & North Western railway today filed tax objections in county court to school, road bond and Lake Forest city tax aggregating \$3,273.06 and 24 other individuals and firms have already registered their complaints to alleged errors in assess-ment and spreading of taxes.

In Seven Districts

The railroad charged that in seven school districts in Waukegan and Shields townships, Deerfield, West Deerfield, Warren and Newport townships, an excessive rate was charged by schools.

An objection was made to the hard road tax in which the railway claimed that the amount was \$1,448 too high due to the fact that the county spread its tax on a 53 cent levy rather than the limit of 25 cents pro-vided by law.

The objections were filed by At-torney Hervey C. Coulson, local coun-sel for the road. The same points are raised each year.

In Lake Forest, which operates un-der a special charter, an excess of \$573 was charged, it was pointed out.

Other Objectors

Others who lodged complaints were: Edward G. Creech, Highland Park, who claimed that his taxes should have been \$600 rather than \$2,000.

Verne Vesper, Waukegan, who de-clared he should have been taxed \$27.37 rather than \$54.77.

Western Union Telegraph com-pany, which claimed an excess amount of \$597 in Shields township. A total of \$2,190 was paid by this company.

Frank Dietz of Zion, charged \$41-17 rather than \$29.26.

Community Service of Highland Park, which does not operate for profit and was taxed \$1,226.

Mrs. Floyd Bennewate, Winthrop Harbor, taxed \$29 instead of \$8.98.

L. P. Erskine and E. M. Runyard, who complained that the rate in Green Bay Ridge subdivision should be \$3.36.

Harry J. McCartney of Antioch who claimed that his taxes were ex-cessive, and should be \$205.82.

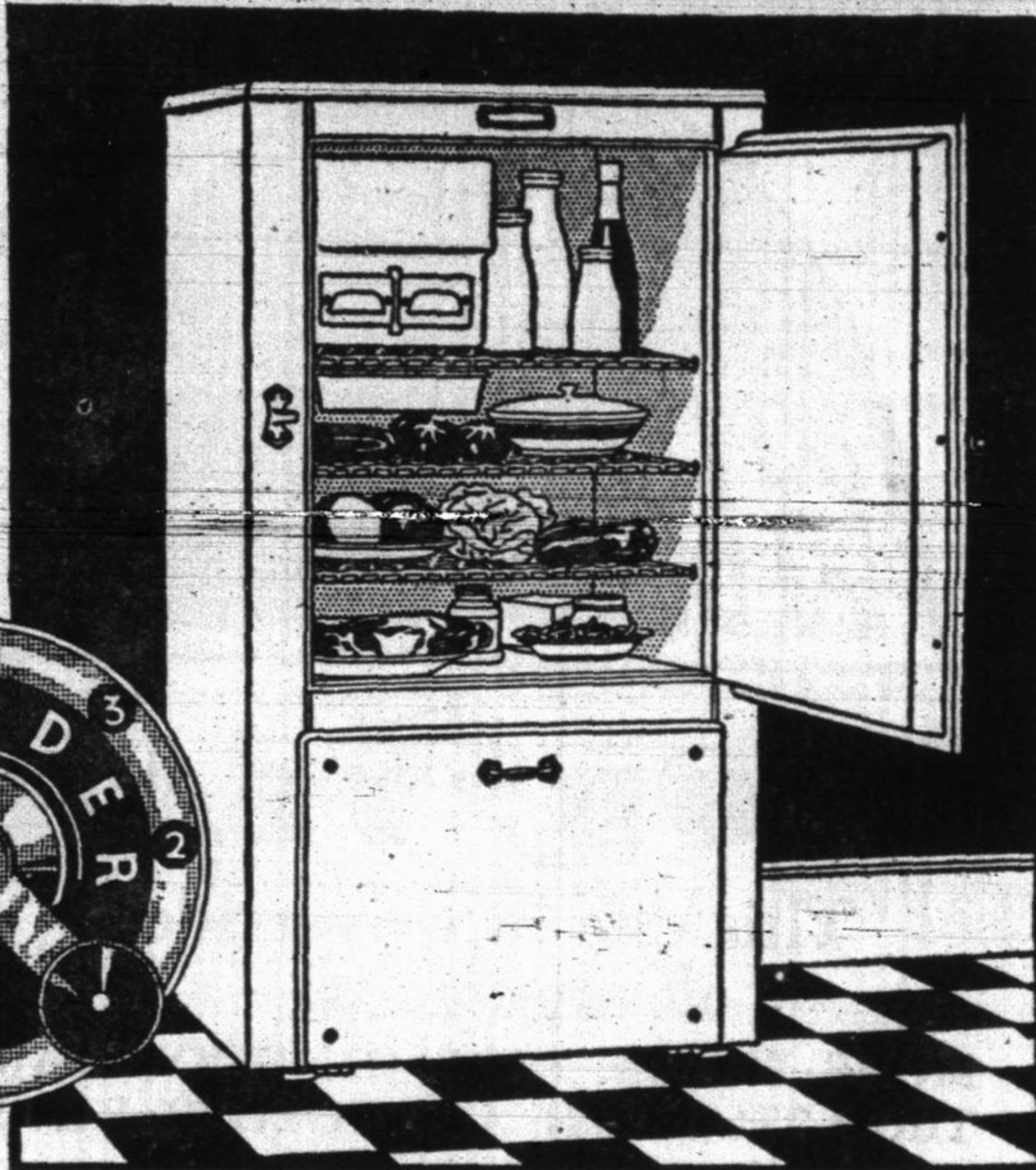
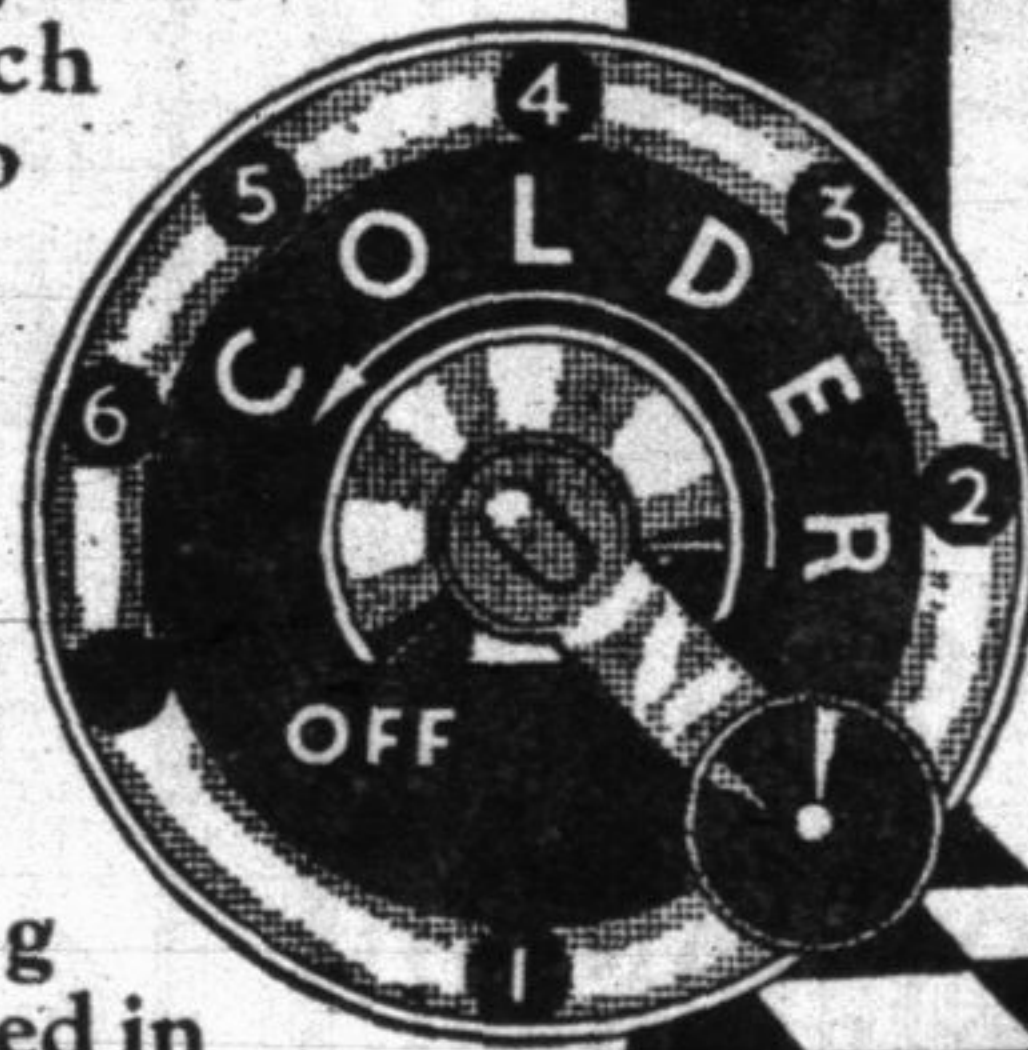
