**WAUKEGAN TO HAVE
HISTORICAL FETE**

**Pioneer Days to Be Recalled in
Pageant June 15; Old Set-
tlers Invited**

The busy city of Waukegan, which is one of the oldest towns in the state, is planning a unique historic fete, "Old Waukegan Days," for June 15th, for the benefit of the Goodfellowship Settlement, located there. The fete will last from noon until dark. It is founded upon a similar fete which is given every two years in Nantucket, Massachusetts, and from there, has spread to Newport, Boston, Marblehead, Deerfield, Philadelphia, and has gradually been coming west.

Old Fashioned Square
On June 15th, beautiful Upton Park in Waukegan will be a great old fashioned Market Square, while the two long blocks south from the Park will be lined with exquisite old fashioned groups representing all of the old pastimes and pleasures of Little Fort and early Waukegan days. Every one will be in the costumes of long ago, and the whole area will be a rare treat for the artists.

In 1860, Abraham Lincoln, visited Waukegan to make a speech, and spent the night there with Elisha P. Ferry, at that time mayor of the city, who later became governor of the State of Washington. Again Lincoln will come to Waukegan on June 15th at 1:00 o'clock to renew his visit and watch all the old familiar groups and meet some of the very same people whom he met 69 years ago. He will head a procession in an old-time coach.

In the procession, Daniel Wright, will be represented by a covered wagon. He was the first white settler in Lake county, and his grandson, now over 90 years of age, hopes to attend the fete. Many old settlers who have lived in the county over 60 years will follow in the procession, also the descendant of the first white boy born in Waukegan. Many scenes in the history of Lake county will appear in the parade. The winning of the county seat for Waukegan by the father of Mrs. E. C. Simmons, wife of the president of the Simmons Bed Manufacturing company of Kenosha, will be represented. Mr. Robinson, this early settler, walked the 250 miles to Springfield, and beat the stage from Libertyville. The first motion picture ever taken of women in the United States, which was made in Waukegan, will be represented, also the first graduating class of Lake county. The old fire engine will be there, too, and the old high wheeled bicycle.

On Sheridan Road
Lincoln will be driven to the fete area on Sheridan road, where he will see many old familiar sights. There will be an old churning party on one lawn, an old quilting party on another, an old-time wedding on one side of the street and a Dame School opposite, a quaint old tea party on one porch and old ladies knitting on another. All along Sheridan road will be these lovely groups.

The Market Square in Upton park will contain a reproduction of Thomas Jenkins store, the first corner grocery of Waukegan. The old flower stand will be there, too, also the thread and needle shop and the candy

counter. Further down the street will be found the old book shop presided over by a descendant of Anne Bradstreet, the first American poet, and here Carl Sandberg will autograph his books on that day. Dorothy Aldis will do the same for her lovely poems and other writers will gather here and read from their own writings.

Old Dolls and Toys
There will be a valuable exhibition of old dolls and play-things open to the little girls on the payment of a small fee, an exhibition of quilts and china for their mothers, and one of Indian relics and war trophies which the boys and men will enjoy. There will be an old house furnished with antiques, many of which will be for sale. There will also be an old home, open to the public, for a small fee where the loveliest of Waukegan's old parties used to be held. This house is interesting for its architecture, especially for its stairway, and some delightful old things within. In contrast to this, the exquisite modern home, which is the last word in building, of Doctor and Mrs. F. A. Besley will be open in the same way. This house contains many treasures also.

Descendants of Pioneers
Over 400 people are assisting in the fete. Among these, many of whom have long lived in Waukegan, are descendants of William of Orange, of Henry Fourth and Fifth of France, of the royal family of England, of Pocahontas, of Governor Bradford of Pilgrim fame, of John and Pricilla Alden and of three other Mayflower passengers, of Artemus Ward, of the families of five of our Presidents, of 11 colonial governors, and of governors of later time, of the hero who fired the first gun of the Revolution, of Ethan Allen, of one of America's most famous novelists of famous European generals and of generals of the Civil War.

In one of the cities where the fete has recently been given the leading paper says: "It is the most beautiful affair ever seen in our city. The

spirit of the whole thing is magnificent."

**Two State Policemen
Hurt in This County**

Two state policemen, on the way to join an auto-license drive in Waukegan last week, were injured in two separate accidents. State Policeman John Daley of Round Lake was taken to the Lake County hospital Wednesday critically injured, as the result of a collision between his motorcycle and a laundry truck from Chicago, and State Policeman Arthur Froelich of Lake Geneva was found unconscious beside his motorcycle on Route 22, near Prairie View the same day. Daley's condition was critical.
