Annual Flower Show at Lake Forest on Saturday and Sunday

The committee for the Lake Forest Garden club flower show, to be held Saturday and Sunday in the service buildings of Villa Turicum, Mrs. Rockefeller McCormick's Lake Forest estate, are busy setting up the background for the show. Monday they were assisting an artist to paint modernistic garden scenery for the class for flower arrangements on metal stands. Mrs. John Andrews King is chairman.

In the garden gate class, which is considered to be the chief feature of this year's show, Mrs. D. Mark Cummings, Mrs. Walter S. Brewster, and Mrs. William E. Casselberry, Jr., are entrants.

Flower Market

The weekly flower market conducted by the Garden club, will be a feature of the show.

It is not necessary that exhibitors themselves grow the flowers which they show. Primarily, the affair is to illustrate the decorative use of flowers and flowering shrubs, and while the quality of the flowers used in the exhibits will be given consideration, the deciding factor in awarding prizes will be the manner in which they are used. Housewives, generally, and lovers of flowers, in particular, will find the exhibits of great interest.

Are Six Classes

Entries, which closed Tuesday evening, are made under six different classifications. Class 1 calls for arrangements by children, with a section for children under ten, and another for those between eleven and fifteen years.

Class 2 deals with bouquets and containers, and in one section of this class each entry will include two identical vases, one filled with flowers suitable for the container, and the other with flowers unsuitable. Other sections in this class will exhibit modernistic arrangements, Victorian arrangements, and contrasting arrangements.

Class 3 will show flowers for the breakfast and dinner tables, and for special occasions, such as weddings and holiday feasts. One section in this class will include a fruit and flower arrangement.

Class 4 will exhibit flower arrangements in metal stands.

Class 5 will deal with sketches and detailed information for garden gates.

Class 6 is the only one in which the quality of the flower will be the deciding factor. Peonies and a collection of six perennials will make up the sections in this class.
