Zion Radio Station to Resume June 23; Limited Broadcast

Formal announcement was made Friday that Radio Station WCBD of Zion is to resume broadcasting on a limited schedule on Sunday, June 23. This decision is in response to thousands of requests from radio listeners all over the country, including Waukegan and Lake county.

The powerful Zion station has been silent since November 11 of last year when the reallocation of radio wavelengths went into effect. Under this reallocation station WCBD was prohibited from broadcasting at night and also was placed on a greatly reduced wavelength.

Before the reallocation became effective WCBD divided time with Station WLS of Chicago on a wavelength of 345 meters. Under the change the Zion station was reduced to 277.6 meters, dividing time with Station WM-BI, the Moody Bible Institute station of Chicago. Both stations were prohibited from night broadcasting. A station at Charlotte, N. C., has been allotted full time on this wavelength.

Glencoe Plans Fourth of July Celebration

A patriotic service, races and swimming events, fire works and music and the formal opening of the Glencoe bathing beach will be among features of the approaching Fourth of July celebration in Glencoe.

The affair will be for Glencoe citizens. It will be held in Lake Front park and all churches, schools and civic bodies are aiding the Glencoe Men's club and the chamber of commerce, sponsors of the plan, in the preparations.

The Glencoe Park board will erect a flag pole in the park and the flag to be hoisted on this occasion is being donated by the Glencoe chapter, D.A.R.

BUILDING SLUMP IS SHOWN IN SUBURBS

First Five Months of This Year Indicate Reduction; May Be Overcome Later

As the suburbs come down the first half of the stretch "1929 figures" is several lengths behind "1928 figures." In the race just finished May 1928 won with the largest volume of building permits, April 1929 came in second and May 1929 finished in third place.

Suburban building construction shows evidence of a slump which can be overcome only if the good building weather of the summer months and early fall produce increased records. The situation is spotty.

May Records

Evanston last month about equaled its record of a year ago but was 96 per cent ahead of April this year. Oak Park showed consistent losses while Gary, the largest suburb in the metropolitan district, also indicated both May and April losses. Significant May gains were evidenced, however, as follows: Berwyn 38 per cent, Des Plaines 29 per cent, Dolton 550 per cent, Hinsdale 33 per cent, Joliet 35 per cent, Lombard 19 per cent, Mount Prospect 26 per cent, North Chicago 8 per cent, Park Ridge 10 per cent, River Forest 31 per cent,

West Chicago 996 per cent Whiting 210 per cent. Cicero with a 2 per cent gain and Lake Forest with a 4 per cent gain were in the running in the May comparison.

Gains Over April

Results were considerably better in the comparison of construction figures for May with April this year. The following suburbs made gains over April: Berwyn 64 per cent, Chicago Heights 26 per cent, Dolton 15 per cent, Elgin 65 per cent, Glencoe 107 per cent, Harvey 12 per cent, Highland Park 3 per cent, Hinsdale 96 per cent, Kenilworth 50 per cent, Lake Forest 33 per cent, Lombard 400 per cent, Maywood 53 per cent, Park Ridge 3 per cent, Riverdale 87 per cent, St. Charles 335 per cent, Wheaton 234 per cent, East Chicago 22 per cent, Hammond 21 per cent and Whiting 36 per cent.

For the first five months of this year the suburbs reporting had total volume of \$35,103,610 as against \$51,309,358 for the first five months of last year. The figures for the five months comparison were as follows:
