Gala Performance of "Manon Lescaut" First Offering; Program Next Week

With a gala performance of Puccini's colorful opera "Manon Lescaut" the eighteenth season of Ravinia Opera will open Saturday night, June 22. Mme. Lucrezia Bori will be cast in the title role with Giovanni Martinelli opposite her as the Chevalier Des Grieux. Others importantly cast are Mme. Ina Bouskaya, Jose Mojica, Desire Defrere, Louis D'Angelo, Giordano Paltrinieri and Paolo Ananian. Gennaro Papi will conduct.

In selecting this work as his initial offering, Mr. Eckstein could scarcely have made a better choice with which to usher in the new season. It is the Italian version of one of the most celebrated romances which has ever been given operatic setting, and from the time it became a part of the Ravinia repertoire, it has been a prime favorite with Ravinia audiences. In it Mme. Bori displays that subtle artistry which has made her one of the world's greatest opera singers, and both covally and histrionically she sounds the character of Manon to the depths. Mr. Martinelli is completely at home as the hero, and in this part he demonstrates the fact that although he is a dramatic tenor of the first rank he can, when occasion demands, employ a dulcet lyric method.

NORTH ANNEX TO MORAINE IS OPEN

Handsome and Commodious New Structure with 80 Rooms; Special Features

In the new North annex of the Moraine hotel opened June 15, comfort and convenience of the guests coupled with marvellous views of Lake Michigan and the intervening woods beyond the landscaped environs of the buildings provide hotel accommodations and privileges unequalled anywhere in the country.

That all of the eighty rooms of the new building are already rented and main building in 1900 is one of the history in the Chicago region.

Has Eighty Rooms The North Annex is built on the edge of a beautiful ravine and is about 145 by 60 feet in dimensions. Its 80 rooms are all large and well lighted each provided with a modern bathroom with fixtures in varied shades and all accessories harmonizing. An Otis elevator gives easy access to the upper floors, and the building is heated from the main oilburning heating plant of the hotel built two years ago with capacity great enough to take care of the entire plant and two more buildings as large as the new one, if needed.
