## FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN EVANSTON

**Samuel E. Knight, Well Known  
Chicago Banker, Victim  
of Heart Disease**

Samuel E. Knight, vice president of State Bank of Chicago, died Saturday, June 15, at his residence in the Orrington hotel, Evanston. The cause of his death was heart disease, which had troubled him for sometime.

Mr. Knight, son of the late John and Henrietta Knecht, was born in Deerfield in the house on Waukegan road, now owned and occupied by Matt Hoffman.

He was an attorney during the World war and as feeling ran high against the Germans he and brother John changed their names to Knight.

Mr. Knight graduated from North Central college, Naperville, in 1886, and from Northwestern law school in 1891. He practiced law in the city for 10 years prior to entering the State bank.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, June 18, at 3 p. m., from First Congregational church, Evanston.

Mr. Knight was a member of the Royal Arcanum and has for years been a member of the supreme council of the Royal league and chairman of its investment committee.

He was a member of the First Congregational church at Evanston, where he was very active. Also a member of Union League club of Chicago, the Bankers' club, the Chicago Bar association and Westmoreland Country club. Mr. Knight was a director of the Chicago Theological seminary and chairman of finance committee.

Surviving him are his wife, Mary E. Knight, a son, Howard W., two grandchildren, one brother, John J. Knight, three sisters, Mrs. Ella M. Mayer, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Warfield, and Mrs. Julia Cowell.

## Deerfield Mourns Death of L. Oberrauch

The community was deeply grieved at the sudden death of Mr. Louis Oberrauch, which occurred early Tuesday morning, June 11.

He was born August 14, 1882, on Bozon, Tyrol, Austria. At the age of 18 Mr. Oberrauch came to America, first locating in Chicago.

October 17, 1907, he was married to Miss Louise Nollenberger of Chicago. Since 1912 Mr. and Mrs. Oberrauch have been residents in the neighborhood of Deerfield, during which time the family gained many friends who esteemed them most highly, both as neighbors and associates.

He leaves to mourn his departure his bereaved wife, two daughters, Elsie and Clara, three sisters and two brothers living in Germany.
