N. S. Sanitary Board Defers Building of Big Waukegan Plant

Building of the proposed \$500,000 sewage disposal plant in Waukegan will not be carried out this year according to the decision of the North Shore Sanitary district board. Instead the erection of this big plant will in all probability be started in 1930 it was stated, according to the Waukegan Sun.

Decision to defer the erection of the plant was based on the inability of the board to come to an agreement with the city council on the location of the building. Members of the board favor placing of the plant on the North Flats while the city council believes that it would serve a better purpose if it were located at the foot of South avenue.

The Sanitary district board today made public its ordinance providing for appropriations for the ensuing year. The sum allotted totals \$85,700.

Included in the appropriations are \$15,000 for maintaining all plants, \$1,000 for contingent fund, \$900 for engineering expenses, \$7,600 for completing North Chicago disposal plant; \$35,000 for completing North flats plant at Waukegan, \$16,000 for completing plant in Zion and \$5,000 for sheeting and piers to protect pipe line at Highland Park plant. The rest of the funds are allotted to payment of salary and offices expense of the board.

Former Resident of County Killed Last Week in Motor Crash

Collision of a motor truck with an automobile brought death to Mrs. Ella Roder, 71 years old, who had resided in Lake county for nearly all of her life, and injury to her husband, John Roder, at the intersection of Milwaukee avenue and Dempster street roads, last week.

William Hintz, of Desplaines, driver of the truck, was taken into custody by Cook county police and is being held pending investigation into the accident.

The accident was due, it is believed to the failure of the driver of the truck to see the automobile until it was too late to avoid the accident.

Mrs. Roder was hurried to the St. Francis hospital in Evanston, but her death occurred shortly after the accident. Her husband was found to have been only slightly injured.

The victim was born near Lake Zurich and had spent nearly all of her 71 years of life in that neighborhood. She moved to Chicago several years ago with her husband to make her home at 2744 Thomas street in that city.

The couple were on their way to their home when the accident occurred.

Lake County Farmers Indemnified for Loss

Lake county farmers, who lost 553 cattle since Jan. 1 through tests for bovine tuberculosis, were indemnified to the extent of \$60,566.13, according to a report made last week by Dr. T. P. Gallahue, county veterinarian, to the county board.

Of this amount \$33,681.57 came from salvage from the carcasses and \$26,885.39 in straight indemnity.

Since Jan. 1 Dr. Gallahue and assistants from the state department have tested 21,223 cattle, which comprise 1,409 herds, of which 553 were infected. The percentage of reactors ran but 2.5 per cent.

This made the average condemnation price per head \$19.13.

The largest loss was in Wauconda township where 102 cattle out of 1,858 were found to be reactors. Shields township with 124 cattle was found to be perfect. The test was accepted along the lake shore before it was in many parts of the western half of the county, it is understood.

A specimen of the South American anaconda, a species of snake which ranks among the largest in the world, is to be seen in the department of zoology at Field Museum of Natural History.
