corridors, and similar spaces used neither frequently nor during extended periods, shall not be deemed as coming within the scope of this term.

(1) A Serving Pantry shall be defined as a room used for the storage or serving of food, but not for the cooking of same.

(2) A Dinettes or breakfast Room shall be defined as a room used exclusively for the serving and eating of food. Such a room shall have a floor area of not less than 30 square feet and window or windows of gross area of not less than 10 square feet opening on to a street, alley or yard, and also an adjoining Habitable Room.

(3) A Kitchenette for the purposes of this ordinance shall be a room having a net floor area of not less than 25 square feet nor more than 40 square feet. Such area may include cases, tables, or cupboards customary to such rooms. Every room used as a Kitchenette shall have a window or windows of combined area of not less than 10 square feet opening on a street, alley or yard, or in lieu of such window requirement, mechanical ventilation to remove therefrom not less than 30 cubic feet of air per minute. All Kitchenettes shall be provided with some form of air inlet from adjoining rooms or rooms which shall be open when the door is closed.

The ventilating ducts and the entire ventilating apparatus for the Kitchenettes in a building shall be maintained separate and distinct, from intake to discharge, without connection with any other ventilating system in the building.

No ventilation shall be considered to be mechanical ventilation unless it is maintained in continuous efficient operation between the hours of 6:00 A.M. and 11:00 P.M. of each day that the building shall be occupied for residence purposes.

All such ventilation shall be subject to inspection at any reasonable time during operating periods and there shall be an annual fee of \$1.00 for the inspection of such ventilating system.

Failure to maintain and operate such ventilating system as hereinbefore specified shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than (\$25.00) Twenty-Five Dollars, for each and every separate offense, and for the purposes of this ordinance, each and every day that such system does not comply with requirements hereof, shall be construed as a separate offense.

SECTION II. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are and each of them is hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION III. WHEREAS, public health and safety are endangered and threatened by conditions under the present ordinance, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

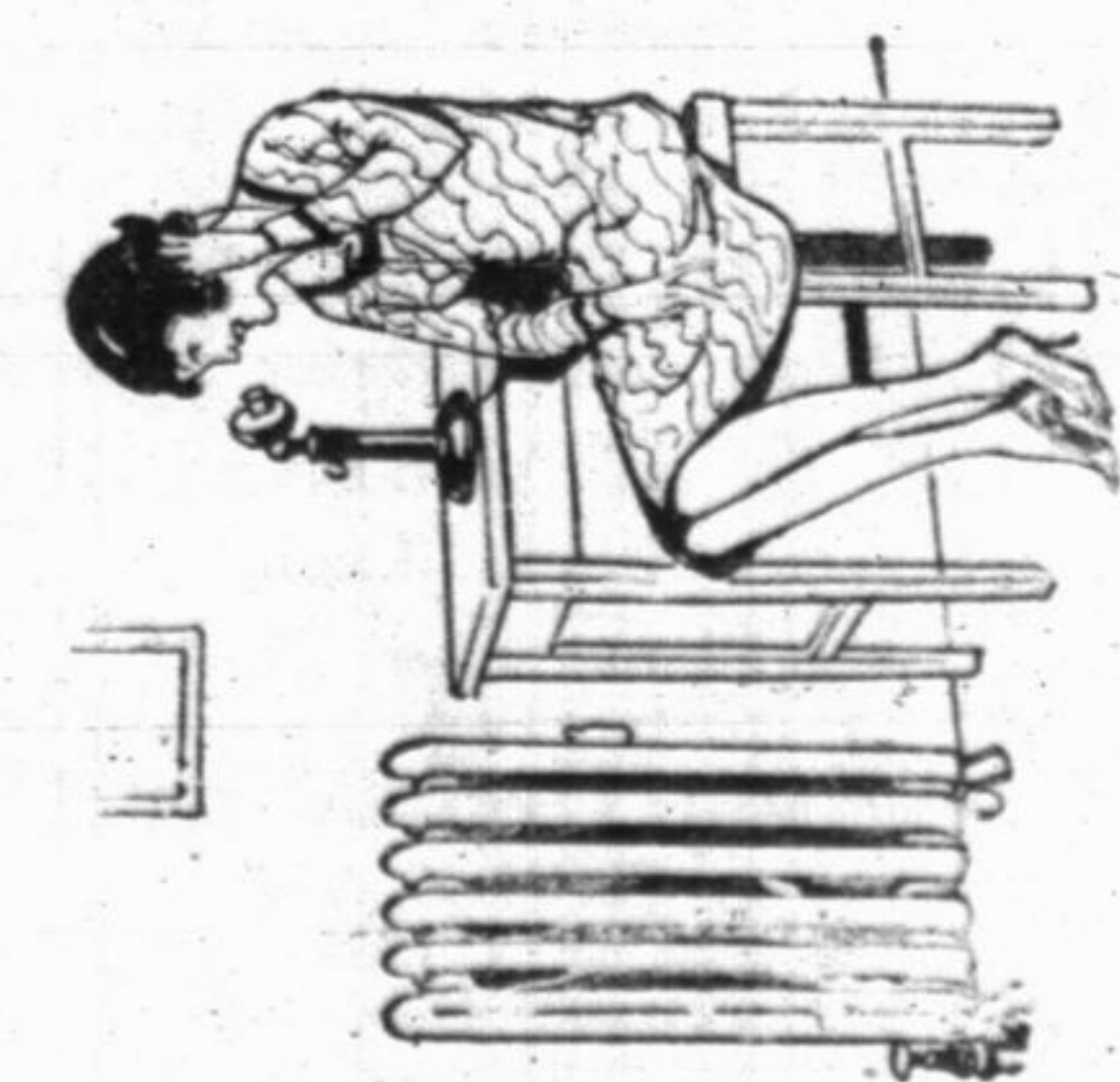

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## Supervisors Inspect Lake County Hospital

Members of the county board, in order to be conversant with conditions at the Lake County General hospital, which has succeeded the county farm at Libertyville as the perennial problem of the board, last week visited the institution at the request of the hospital committee.

Supervisor David Van Patten, chairman of that committee, stated that a conference was to be held with Oscar Sandstrom, a contractor, to get some idea as to what it would cost to put the institution in repair. Any request for repairs will be presented to the board, Van Patten stated.

The hospital has been exceeding the annual appropriation on an average of \$12,000 for the past two years, the board has been advised, and plans are to be made, if possible, to reach an equitable appropriation and a curtailment of expenditures so that no overdrafts will be made.

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
