In using the automatic ice boxes for freezing ice cream, we find that we must use a little different process from that used with the ordinary freezer. I am giving here a recipe for Vanilla Ice Cream which I have found to be very satisfactory and which will give a smooth, creamy

I have found that a very little gelatine is a help, but only a little should be used. In this recipe I use only one teaspoon, for we do not want a

I have also found that cooking the sugar, or at least melting it, is a help; also that substituting part white corn syrup will help to make it creamy.

For this ice cream I also whip the cream, but would not do that when freezing it in the ordinary freezer. I would either add more milk to the cooked part, or add more plain cream.

Vanilla Ice Cream

3 tablespoons white corn syrup

1 teaspoon flour

1 teaspoon gelatine

1 tablespoon cold milk

1 egg separated Few grains of salt

11/2 pint whipping cream

Scald milk in double boiler, add sugar, flour and syrup mixed together, gradually adding a little of the hot milk and mixing so that it will be smooth. Return to double boiler and cook a minute or two, until

Pour gradually onto the slightly beaten egg yolk, return to boiler and cook two minutes, stirring constantly to keep it smooth.

Remove from fire, add the salt and the gelatine, which has been soaked for five minutes in the tablespoon of cold milk, stirring until dissolved. Allow to get thoroughly cold.

When cold beat until light, add vanilla and the cream which has been whipped until thick, then beat well together. Fold in the stiffly beaten white of the egg, last, place in freezing unit of ice box and leave for several hours to freeze. This recipe will make one quart of ice cream.

This may be left over night, or even for several days, if kept in the freezing unit.

Arrest Man for Biting Cops Ear, Speeding, Etc.


