Lake Bluff Planning Purchase of Chemical Fire Truck Shortly

Lake Bluff's fire fighting equipment was ordered replaced by a new chemical fire engine at a meeting of the village board last week. The present old Ford engine has long been considered inadequate for the town's needs, so the new truck will embody all of the most modern chemical equipment.

The equipment will consist mainly of two 40-gallon tanks of chemicals and two leads of hose. One tank is designed to be used at a time, so that an empty tank can be refilled with the alternate tank is in use. The truck will also be equipped with ladders, picks, and all other necessary implements. The cost of the new equipment will be about \$2,600.

Discussion of the purchase of a garbage truck was also brought up at the meeting, but it was moved that action be deferred to a future meeting.

Warns of Placing Ads in Rural Mail Boxes

NATURALIZATION OF ALIEN WAR VETERANS

Time Shortened in Which They May Become Citizens, Says League Director

Naturalization of World war veterans has been simplified and the time it takes for them to become citizens shortened as the result of a law recently passed by Congress, Mrs. Kenneth F. Rich, director of the Immigrants' Protective league, told Chicago papers last week.

This measure for the benefit of aliens who served in the United States forces during the World war was supported by the American Legion.

Limited Period Special naturalization privileges have again, for a limited period, been extended to alien veterans as a result of the legion backed measure. Under this act, alien veterans who wish to become naturalized, are now entitled "at anytime within two years after the enactment of this

law, to naturalization upon the same terms, conditions and exemptions, which would have been accorded to such alien if he had petitioned prior to the armistice of the World war."

An added requirement is that the alien shall be required to appear and file his petition in person and to take the prescribed oath of allegiance in open court.

Defies Status

Under the new law alien veterans are defined as follows. The term alien means an individual, a member of the military or naval forces of the United States at anytime after April 5, 1917, and before November 12, 1918, and who is not an alien now inflexible to citizenship. It does not include any individual at any time during such period as thereafter separated from such forces under other than honorable conditions; any conscientious objector who performed no military duty whatever or refused to wear the uniform; or any alien at any time during such period or thereafter discharged from the military or naval forces on account of his allegiance.

Dispatch Urged

Since the naturalization require-

ments are so greatly simplified as to first papers, residence, witnesses and fees, it is distinctly to the advantage of the alien veterans who desire to be naturalized to claim the benefits of this new act without delay. The Immigrants' Protective league, 826 S. Halsted street, Chicago, will provide further information upon request, said Mrs. Rich.

Launch Visits Naval Station; Long Cruise

After a remarkable cruise of over two thousand miles, that was characterized by a lack of any serious mishaps, converted motor launch No. 11,420, recently completed at the Norfolk navy yard for the 42nd Fleet Division of N. S. National Reserve, Burlington, Iowa, entered the harbor at the Great Lakes Naval Training station last week and continued its journey, arriving later at the National Reserve dock at the foot of Randolph street, Chicago.

Motor launch No. 11,420 is a fifty-foot decked-over craft, propelled by a navy type four-cylinder, four-cycle,

model V-4, gasoline engine. It is commanded by Lieutenant Frederick H. Lauder, U. S. Naval Reserve; Ensign P. Ramback, N. S. Naval Reserve; the executive officer and a crew of eight men, comprise the remaining personnel, all of whom belong to the Burlington National Reserve unit.

The cruise started from Norfolk on May 16, the launch proceeding by way of the Chesapeake bay.
