## PAUL M. DIETZ DIES AT DEERFIELD HOME

Cashier of State Bank of That  
Village for Nine Years;  
Funeral Friday

Deerfield and Highland Park and Northbrook friends of Paul M. Dietz, well known cashier of the Deerfield State bank ever since its organization, learned Wednesday morning with deep regret that he had succumbed on Tuesday night to an attack of pneumonia.

Mr. Dietz had been ill only a few days. Saturday he went home from the bank complaining of being ill, and from that time the course of the malady was rapid. He died at 9:00 o'clock Tuesday night at the home of his father-in-law, George Karch, on Deerfield avenue, Deerfield, where he and his wife made their home.

### In Forty-Fourth Year

He was born July 16, 1885, in New Albany, Ind., son of Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Dietz, both of whom are dead. For

a number of years he held a responsible position with the Northern Trust company of Chicago and later removed to Northbrook to reside.

When the Deerfield State bank was organized in December, 1920, he was engaged as its cashier, and that position he held until his death, fulfilling the duties of his office with faithfulness and efficiency and by his genial disposition and many fine qualities winning the high esteem of all who knew him.
