Deerpath Theatre to Show "Q Ships" Big, Authentic War Film

One of the most interesting and thrilling motion pictures ever shown in this section will be the attraction at the Deerpath theatre, Lake Forest, on Friday and Saturday of this week. It is "Q Ships," a film of the activities of those mysterious vessels which Britain used to halt the German onslaught during the war.
