Speed Limit on State Roads Now 45 Miles

Lake county motorists and other auto drivers using the county's highways will be allowed greater freedom hereafter when they wheel along the roadways outside of the corporate limits of the various cities.

Forty-five miles an hour became the official speed limit on Illinois highways at midnight last night as the result of recent legislative action.

.The bill passed by the assembly changes the speed limit from 35 miles an hour, which, it was figured, was too slow a pace for cars on open highways.

The 45 miles an hour limit was a compromise rate set by the legislature after calls had been made for limits ranging from 40 miles an hour to no limit whatever.
