

### To Investigate Real Estate "Lawyer" Deals

Request that the Lake County Bar association provide it with more details as to the claims that real estate brokers are impersonating attorneys or infringing upon the rights of lawyers in closing of real estate transactions or preparing of abstracts, has been made by the Waukegan and North Chicago real estate board in a

letter to Clarence W. Diver as president of the bar association.

The request made by the realtors followed the adoption of a resolution by members of the board in a recent meeting of that body.

The action of the real estate board also serves as a step toward the making of a thorough investigation into the claims of the bar association that the realtors in order that correction may be made in the practices if they are found to be true.

### Mundelein Village Hall Is Dedicated

Formal dedication of the \$35,000 village hall at Mundelein took place Tuesday, July 2, at 2:30 o'clock, and was one of the biggest events in the history of the village.

Several distinguished guests were present, among them being Samuel Insull, Judge Benjamin H. Miller, of Libertyville, village attorney of Mundelein; Mayor Charles Bartlett of Evanston; Luke Grant, publicity manager of the North Shore line, and Rev. Msgr. H. F. Wolfe, procurator of St. Mary's of the Lake seminary; R. F. Rouse, president of the board of trustees, and Rev. C. Arthur Jevne, pastor of the First Congregational church of Mundelein also took part in the program. The North Shore band played.

The new village hall is located on Hawley street, north of the new North Shore railroad station. The land for the site was donated by the Lake County Land association. The site of the hall is some distance east of the present business district but plans are being worked out to move the business district to the new location as soon as possible.

### Mowing Machine Cuts Off Small Boy's Arm

Playful antics of four year old Willie Estes, son of H. M. Estes, a farmer residing near Wadsworth, may result in the loss of one arm and the crippling of the other of the small boy. He was caught by the knives of a mowing machine as he hid in the grass in a field one day last week.

The child apparently followed his father and a hired hand to the field where they were cutting hay. Probably to avoid being seen and sent back to the home or in a spirit of playfulness the child hid in the tall grass in the field.

The first intimation that the two men had of his presence came when the knives of the mowing machine struck the child.

The left arm was almost cut in two while a deep cut was made in the right arm. The child apparently raised his arms to protect himself as the bar of the mowing machine started over his body.

The child was hurried to the Lake County hospital where he was attended by Dr. Karl Beck. It was believed that it would be necessary to amputate the left arm.
