Seventy-three specimens of fossil invertebrates, including barnacles, gastropods and polycypods, have been presented by E. E. Halvorsen of Caalinga, Calif., to Field Museum of Natural History for addition to its paleontological collections.

Field Museum Shows Paintings Done by Madagascar Artists

In the section of the Madagascar exhibits at Field Museum of Natural History devoted to native arts, are several paintings, which, while done by Imerian tribesmen are strikingly European in technique. Two of the pictures are in oils on native-made raffia cloth for canvas, and there are water colors. They are well done, and would be creditable to an artist of the white race.

The paintings are part of the extensive Madagascar ethnological collections obtained by the recent Marshall Field, Jr., expedition to that country. This is the only important collection of Malagasy artifacts in America, and one of the finest collections of its kind in the world.

The Imerina tribe dwell on the east coast of the island. In early times they had no pictorial art of any kind, and as a few whites penetrated the country they became acquainted with European pictures and began to copy their technique. The subjects they depict, however, are confined to the life about them.

The two oil paintings show scenes in east coast villages, while the three water colors represent scenes in the plateau near Tananarivo. Such paintings are now sold in the native markets, and are to be seen in all the native homes of the better sort.

Other Madagascar art objects on exhibition include wood carvings, jewelry, charms, necklaces of beads and coral, silver gold and brass rings, snuffboxes, baskets, ornamental birds carved from horn, toy pigs made from blackened gourds, mats, baskets, dishes and spoons.

The remarkable way in which the Arctic three-toed woodpecker scoops out a deep retort-shaped hollow through the side and downward into the center of a tree trunk is illustrated in an exhibit at Field Museum of Natural History. A section of such a tree nest has been cut to show the inside, where a family of nestlings repose. Outside are seen the parent birds.
