### **New Currency Starts** Circulation July 10; Supply Is Limited

With the opening of banks for busiwide scramble began to acquire some Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Lagare of of the new, attractive, unfamiliar curwill replace the long familiar, much larger paper money now in circulation throughout the country.

With about 912,000,000 pieces already\_printed, the treasury is prepared to meet the "curiosity" demand, but only to a limited extent because of the big problem of distribution.

This change in currency, which is to be completed in about a year, is the first undertaken by the government since 1861 and is expected to reduce the cost of materials, printing, storage and distribution about \$1,500,000 a year.

Only limited amounts of the new currency in denominations from \$1 to \$20 have been made available to the banks for distribution so far. The new National Bank notes are not to be introduced until Monday, and the larger denominations of all kinds will follow.

Carl Bushel, 54, Merrill, Wis., theater owner and gentleman farmer, atally hurt on Green Bay road, Sunday afternoon.


Edward Cerny, 18, 2252 West Twentieth street, Chicago, killed on Morrow avenue, North Chicago, Sunday morning.
