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Continues Hearing on Injunction Suit upon Wauconda R.R. Case

Granting a continuance of thirty days in the hearing on the petition for an injunction restraining W. C. Foster from tearing up and selling the rails of the defunct Palatine, Lake Zurich and Wauconda railroad, Judge Claire C. Edwards intimated that the injunction would be granted unless the plans for the sale of the property are carried out before the case is called on August 5.

Attorneys for Foster, who bought a tax deed on the railroad back in 1919 for about \$7,400, had arranged to sell the rails to a junk dealer and had had some of the rails torn up when the receiver for the road prayed an injunction, says the Waukegan Sun.

Attorney Paul MacGuffin, representing the receiver, declared that unless the injunction went into effect the injunction would be destroyed and the unpaid taxes, amounting to about \$23,000, will eat up the property and no one will get any of their money back again. He said that if the property is left as is, he is attempting to get a settlement for about one-third of the taxes, sell the property as real estate, and possibly clear some small return for the bond holders. All parties agree that the stockholders have lost everything they put into it.

MacGuffin says he has an offer of \$80,000 for the road and hopes to get \$120,000 for the sale of the property. He said that the road cost about \$300,000 to build.

Foster, it is claimed, has not paid the taxes on his portion of the property and the involved question of ownership will be untangled by the various parties before the land is sold.

Until the hearing on the injunction on August 5, no removal of any of the rails, ties or other property will be permitted under court order.

Highland Park Boy Is Great Lakes Graduate
