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Two Views of Status of Booze Business in Lake Co. Are Quoted

Indignant at the unmerited criticism being heaped upon State's Attorney A. V. Smith by the Waukegan Daily Sun, fifty members of the Waukegan chapter of the Women's Temperance Union in special meeting on Thursday of last week, extended a vote of confidence in the prosecutor and commended him for his drive against hoodlum gangsters, who sought to invade Lake county with gambling devices and beer, says the Libertyville Independent.

The expression of the W. C. T. U. commending the prosecutor follows:

"In view of the criticism heaped upon Co. A. V. Smith, an unanimous vote was taken to express to him the confidence of the women of the organization and to commend him for his fearless prosecution of the law in our county of Lake."

Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle declared that the Sun has deliberately misquoted him in numerous articles in their attempt to discredit Col. Smith, and that his office has been co-operating with Col. Smith in every possible way and will continue to take an active part in the campaign to keep the county free from liquor and gambling.

The organization also commended. Senator Ray Paddock for voting against the wet measures during the recent legislative session.

Another View

Indicating that the county is "dry as a bone" and that everything is peaceful, State's Attorney A. V. Smith reiterated his well known "nothing doing" to a Daily Sun reporter, and that is to be taken as evidence that no prohibition violations are being countenanced in the fair county of Lake, says the Waukegan Sun, and continues:

But while the dry raiders supposedly toured the county, making frequent visits to the places alleged to be wet, the back door bars continued to do a brisk business in hard liquor of a vicious type.

Along South Genesee street in Waukegan are three locations where regular patrons are directed to go upstairs and into the rear of the place if they would quench their thirst. During the quiet week days, these places do but little business as only the customers who know how are able to get in, but it is reported that over the week-end, when business would be brisk, a doorman is stationed near the entrance to instruct the thirsty how to get in to the bar.

The dry raiders would find he front doors locked as per the orders of Col. Smith, but the business is being conducted, it is said, behind darkened windows and via the back door route.

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
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
