### SO. GREEN BAY ROAD IMPROVEMENT SOON

Asking for Bids This Important Work; 32-Foot Roadway Planned

Paving of Green Bay road south from the end of the present brick pavement to the south limits of Highland Park is advanced another step with the advertisement in this issue of the Press for bids for the contract on this extensive city improvement project, and it is expected. that in a few months the work will be completed.

The pavement will be similar to the excellent improvement of North Green Bay road, with a roadway 32 feet in width of reinforced concrete, including curb and gutter on each side. The cost also will probably be about the same and is estimated at about \$140,000. The improvement is to be made by special assessment, and the preliminary proceedings are reported completed.

Bids Opened Aug. 5

Bids for the contract will be opened at 7:45 o'clock on August 5, by the Board of Local Improvements, and specifications and blank, proposals may be obtained at the office of the board in the city hall. The successful contractor will be paid in bonds drawing six per cent per annum. The Board of Local Improvements is composed of the following members, W. J. Brown, Lyle Gourley, W. M. Reay, and J. H. Zimmer.
