

There were thirty-seven special assessments in process of collection or settlement at April 30, 1929. Of these thirty-seven funds, five (Nos. 72, 74, 77, 79 and 85) had deficits at April 30, 1929, due to the fact that the public benefits and interest thereon owing by the City and mentioned heretofore had not been paid. Unless paid these funds (together with the others which have public benefits owing on them) will end up with bonds still outstanding and no cash to pay them with, a condition which will hurt the City's credit.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that bids will be received for the construction of a reinforced concrete pavement and concrete combined curb and gutter, with the necessary drainage and other improvements in Green Bay Road from Edgewood Road to the South Limits of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefor.

Said bids will be received by the Board of Local Improvements at its office in the City Hall, Highland Park, Illinois, until 7:45 P. M. on the 5th day of August, 1929, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

**Fog Causes Mail Pilot to Make Forced Landing**

Blinded by the dense fog that hung like a pall over the earth which might have apprized him of his location, Pilot R. L. Smith of a south bound Minneapolis to Chicago airmail plane was forced to chance disaster to himself and two passengers in bringing his plane down through the heavy vapor into a field on the Birke farm, one mile north of Wadsworth, at 8:15 o'clock last Thursday night.

One hour later, ten sacks of air mail the cargo of the big plane was in the Waukegan postoffice being

made ready for shipment to Chicago by train. The two passengers who were on the plane also came to Waukegan and boarded trains for Chicago.

Pilot Smith immediately after landing obtained the assistance of farmers in the vicinity of the field and the mail was rushed to the Waukegan postoffice with all possible speed in an effort to lessen the delay as much as possible.
