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Invents New Screen
for Talking Movies

A device in the shape of a screen combining sound reproduction and regarded as the most radical departure since the development of talking pictures, has just been perfected, after years of research work and experimentation, by E. F. Potter, president of the Potter Manufacturing company of North Chicago, with the able assistance of Philip E. Edelman, consulting engineer at the plant. Elimination of mechanical tones that cause the talking pictures to lose much of their realism, and the substitution of full, rounded, natural tones, are the principal claims for distinction of the new device.

Kelsey Grove Seeking
Status As a Village

The community of Kelsey Grove near Wauconda last week petitioned County Judge Perry L. Persons for the right to vote on its proposed incorporation as a village.

The petition was entered by Attorney Harold Hansen in behalf of residents in the area. Judge Persons ruled that the election be held within the proposed village area at the garage of Frank Kelsey on Saturday, Aug. 10.

The community has a population of about 200 people and covers an area of not exceeding two square miles. It runs along the Fox river on one side and the Fox river-Wauconda road on the other.

M., at which time the bids will be opened and considered.

All bids shall be sealed and deposited with the City Clerk for presentation to the Council at said meeting.

Said described property will be sold to the highest and best bidder therefor for cash.

Bids will be received either for the house and garage together or, for the house and garage as separate units.

Bids shall be accepted by a three-fourths vote of the members of the Council of the City of Highland Park.

Said ordinance provides that the Council may, by a majority vote, reject any and all bids, and it may adjourn consideration of said bids to the next regular meeting of the said Council. Said ordinance also provides that, in the event of the acceptance by the Council of the bid or bids for said property, the Mayor and City Clerk are directed to execute and deliver to the purchaser a bill of sale under the seal of the City of Highland Park embodying the terms and conditions of said ordinance set forth.

Said ordinance so passed on Monday, June 24, 1929, is on file in the office of the City Clerk in the City Hall and is open to public inspection.
