Ravinia Garden Club **Holds Fine Meeting**

The Ravinia Garden club, of which Mrs. C. C. Brackett, of Wilmot road, Deerfield, is an honorary member, held the July meeting in the beautiful garden of Mrs. Brackett, wherethe tallest delphinium ever seen in this locality, formed a background for the interesting program presented, while airplanes soared overhead. Fifty-five guests from the Glencoe, Wilmette, Highland Park, Deerfield and Bannockburn and Ravinia garden clubs were present.

Mrs.Frederick Fisher, of Lake Bluff, president of the Garden Club of Illinois, told of the flower show of the Central West which will take place in April of next year, under the auspices of the Garden Club of Illinois, in the Stadium on Warren-avenue, near Paulina street, Chicago. Previously the annual state exhibit has teen held in the Sherman hotel, but this year a larger building with adequate space has been secured, with an opportunity to make some money for the Garden Club of Illinois.

The outstanding educational feature of the afternoon was Mrs. Walter Bradford Metcalf's scholarly paper on "The Magic of Herbs," which had its inspiration in a visit to Greek Orthodox church in Geneva, Switzerland, last year, where the burning of incense led Mrs. Metcalf into a search for the ingredients of the pungent accessory to worship.

"Knowledge is of no value except when it is useful in the construction of new ideas," and the idea in this case was a preparation of a delightful paper for the garden clubs.

In "Plants that have magic," Mrs. Metcalf began with the earliest records of healing, when man was poisoned by his own venom, cited the hippocratic oath, learned by the medival student before he graduates, and required by many of the best medical fraternities as an initiation cath, and told of the superstitions connected with the healing of the sick. When that failed they relied upon superstition. "The magic of flowers which carry myths; legends, and poetry in silent speech, ready to give joy, beauty, rest, and uplift to sculs" was exemplified in the wonderful garden of the hostess which was viewed in sunshine and in shadow, before and after the meeting.

A guest from California said that the garden reminded her of Mary Pickford's.


