Historic Pageant Feature of Program for Northbrook Day

Instead of the usual parade with commercial floats, decorated automobiles, etc., Northbrook, on August 10, is to present the history of Northbrook in a pageant.

The pageant committee, of which Ruth Reichelt Pettis is chairman, desires to encourage all the children and marching organizations to participate in portraying the historical background of the community in a sort of pageant of progress.

Prizes will be awarded for excellence in historical presentation.

Organizations of the neighboring towns are invited to share in presenting this historical pageant.

Each group will be allotted a place in the parade and in addition will have five minutes in which to present its historical picture on the stage in the grove.

The committee has issued an outline of the pageant, which is not necessarily complete, and may be added to, should any groups desire.

The outline thus far is divided into fifteen groups:

1. Colonial background out of which the first settlers in this region came.
2. Prairie Schooner Days.
3. Log cabin days and Indian contacts.
4. Pony Express.
5. Impersonations of early settlers by remaining members of families.
6. Gold Rush "Forty-Niners."
7. Civil War days.
8. Early schools.
8. Early churches.
10. A picture of the 80's in song and dance.
11. First railroad in 1871.
12. "Then and Now"—contrasting methods of transportation, costumes, machinery, etc.
13. Spanish War days.
14. Town's share in World war.
15. Beginning of present day civic organizations.

This is an opportunity for young and old to get out the hoop-skirts, spinning wheels, ancient bicycles, antiquated automobiles, etc.
