

### FT. SHERIDAN CAMP RECALLS WAR DAYS

#### Two Thousand Young Men Learning Military Discipline; Many Other Features

Scenes reminiscent of army days during the World war are being enacted at Fort Sheridan each day as two thousand boys from Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan go through their paces at the seventh annual citizens' military training camp.

Hardy farmer boys, city toughs, high school lads, timid ones, all manner of raw recruits make up Camp Deiley, Sheridan's citizen camp.

#### Many Rejected

Nearly 50 per cent of the men are from Cook county, principally from Chicago. The rest reside in northern Illinois, southern Wisconsin and Michigan. So popular has peace time war training become this year that several hundred were rejected for lack of facilities. Many of them will be cared for at Camp Custer.

The citizens' military training camp has been in existence at Fort Sheridan since 1926. Illinois men were trained prior to that time at Camp Grant, Rockford, and Camp Custer.

Active direction rests with Brig. Gen. Casper H. Conrad, Jr., post commander at the Fort, assisted by a regular staff of army officers. Training is handled by the commissioned personnel of the 342d Infantry, commanded by Col. John H. Dore, reserve.

#### Daily Program

The daily program schedules military drill and instruction with lessons in citizenship in the morning, physical training and athletic sports in the afternoon, and entertainments in the evening; these include lectures, (Continued on page 52)

### North Shore Polo Four Defeat Fort Sheridan

Dedicating Fort Sheridan's new field Sunday, the North Shore four defeated the army players in a hard-fought game, 10 to 5, before a crowd of 3,000.

In many respects the occasion was the most spectacular of the season's polo events. It marked the appearance of the highest ranking army officer who ever engaged in the sport here, Maj. Gen. Frank Parker, commandant of the Sixth Corps area.

The dedication was also the signal for colorful decorations about the field, and a further innovation was the turnout of Fort Sheridan's band of 200 pieces.

Gen. Parker played for five of the eight chukkers, during which he scored a goal and aided his teammates in making several more. Another high ranking officer in the Fort Sheridan lineup was Lt. Col. N. E. Margette, who put up a sterling defensive exhibition at back.

Herbert Lorber, captain of North Shore, proved the scoring ace of the game, with five goals to his credit. His hard riding and deadly aim were a feature of the match.

### H. P. Woman Dies from Injuries in Chicago

Mrs. Edwena Campbell, 45 years old, of 354 Marshman avenue, Highland Park, died Sunday night, in the Chicago Memorial hospital, in Chicago, as a result of head injuries which she received last Thursday when the car in which she was riding in Highland Park on the way to Chicago, struck a bump in the street, throwing her violently against the top of the car.

She did not seem seriously hurt at first, but on Friday, her condition became worse and she was taken to the hospital. The inquest was held in Chicago at 1:30 Monday afternoon, and the funeral service was held Tuesday afternoon at the Glencoe Union church.

The pool is opened at 9 a. m. for grammar school boys; 10 a. m. for grammar school girls. High school boys come at 12:30 p. m. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and high school girls at 12:30 p. m. Tuesday and Thursday. Women come at 12 noon daily.
