Gasoline in Storage Is Liable to the Tax

Garret De F. Kinney, director of finance, under whose department administration of the gasoline tax law is placed, calls attention to a section of the law which provides that all gasoline in storage on August 1 is liable to the tax even though purchased during July.

Penalties for violation of the provision may be a fine of from \$25 to \$500 and imprisonment in the county jail not longer than six months. In addition, the offender is liable for the amount of tax due together with all costs necessary to its collection. Owners of filling stations face an additional penalty in that their licenses to operate may be revoked. Ten days is allowed in which to report to the department of finance on gasoline so stored, and payment to the department of the amount of tax due on the stored gasoline must be made immediately thereafter.

Vote July 23 on High School at Grayslake

County Superintendent of Schools A. Simpson has fixed July 23 as the date for the election which will determine whether or not a high school will be built to serve students in Avon community. The action was taken following the presentation of a petition signed by 50 residents of the town of Avon requesting a vote on the proposition.

Two polling places will be established for the day—one in Grayslake and one in Round Lake. Notices were sent out in the district Tuesday.

If the proposition is carried the school will probably be built in Grayslake with funds being raised by taxation.

From preliminary reports it appears that the residents of the Avon community are in favor of the proposed new building. It is claimed that over 50 per cent of the students registered at Libertyville high school live in Grayslake, Round Lake, Fox Lake and other communities in the western part of the county. Backers point out that all of these students would attend the new school if it is established.

Planning Addition to State Centennial Bldg.

Bids are expected to be advertised next month for construction of the new addition to the state centennial building at Springfield, for which work is expected to be started by September 1.

The new addition, to be five stories in height, will centralize state offices now scattered about in rented offices throughout the city.

Repair work on the state capitol building and construction of additions to the tunnel connecting the capitol to its power plant also is expected to be started this fall. Money for the work also was provided at the last session of the assembly.

Officials face a problem in disposition of the large number of Lincoln relics and papers, now at the tomb here, while the tomb is being remodeled. It is planned to remove the Lincolnia from the tomb entirely following its remodeling, plans for which have been drawn by State Architect Hammond and approved by Governor Louis L. Emmerson. Where the matter will be placed has not been decided.

Industrial Gains in Illinois Are Shown

Statistics on the industrial development of the state of Illinois as issued by the research department of the Illinois Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the United States department of commerce, which compare the latest figures, 1927, with those of 1925, show how Illinois is rapidly forging to the front as an industrial center. According to the state chamber's survey there were 801 more manufacturers in Illinois in 1927 than there were in 1925, based on reports covering cities of 10,000 population or over. The gain of 911 plants was offset by reports of only 110 decreases in the two year interval.

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
