**Dick Martin's 147 Wins Annual
Tournament at Local Club;
Three Birdies**

Dick Martin, captain elect of the University of Illinois golf team, won the annual Braves day tournament at Briergate club last Thursday. He scored 78 in the morning but turned in a 69 in the afternoon to win by one shot from Arthur B. Sweet of Ridgewood, who shot 74-74-148.

More than 200 members and guests played the course, somewhat shortened by the heavy rain of the preceding night, but the 200 trudged around under blue skies on a perfect golf day, though many of the guests found the long second shot carries too much for them to shoot their home club handicap.

Race for Low Gross

The race for the low gross prize on the 36 holes was the closest, for Martin, Sweet, Jimmy Miller of Exmoor, and Gus Novotny of Edgewood Valley, were in the running. In order they scored 78, 74, 75 and 76 in the morning, which wasn't enough variation to worry about. Sweet had the best start, three under par, for the first seven holes, but finished badly.

The battle went on in the afternoon. Miller found a down hill lie in the sand with his second on the first hole. His blast out caught the sand too far behind the ball and he played his next from a flower bed, looking at the pansies instead of the ball. That meant an eight on the hole and he was out. Sweet and Novotny plugged along fairly close to par, but meanwhile young Martin was flashing heavy speed.

Martin Gets Three Birdies

His approach on the second stopped six inches from the pin for a birdie and he got on in two on the par five, sixth for another birdie. That put him out in 34 and he was even par on the others to par five twelfth, where his second stopped on the edge (Continued on page 25)
