

WAUKEGAN ROAD IS HIGHWAY ORPHAN

Not Included in New Gasoline Tax Law Provisions in Effect from Aug. 1st

A technicality of the law, by which route 42A, between the Cook county and Wisconsin state lines, was left out of the new gasoline tax law in its provisions for maintaining and widening state roads, has left this important through road a highway orphan, according to Putney Haight, highway editor of the Chicago Tribune.

An effort to induce Gov. Emmer-son's determination committee to make a special recommendation for widening this road from the Cook county line to the Wisconsin state line with funds other than gasoline tax money has been launched by the Chicago Motor club, and arrange-ments were made to bring the sub-ject before a mass meeting of citi-zens at Waukegan.

According to Charles M. Hayes, president of the motor club, the ex-clusion of this highway from gaso-line tax benefits will be a serious blow at the whole plan of radial highway widening, which was the basis for the passage of the new tax law.

Important Radial Highway

"Route 42A carries a traffic esti-mated at 40,000 to 60,000 vehicles a day in the summer season, the bulk of Chicago-Wisconsin motor car movement," Mr. Hayes said.

"If the comprehensive plan for widening radial highways for 100 miles or more is expected to meet the demand for the expansion of Chi-cago's highway facilities the omis-sion of 42A will mean that a third of the benefits figured for a widened radial system will be cut off. Some means must be devised at once to bring this great important highway into the proposed system.

Wisconsin Ready to Widen

"The state of Wisconsin is prepar-ed to begin operations widening the highway as far as Milwaukee when and if Illinois proceeds to widen to the state line. The two projects would mean a straight run of 90 miles over a four lane road and would constitute the longest highway of this width in America.

"More than three million cars pass over this road annually, according to our estimates, and it is in a constant state of congestion north of the Cook county line where narrow pavement resumes, at the end of the county widening. Motor transportation between Chicago and Milwaukee is too important a thing to justify the rec-ognition of any obstacle, legal or otherwise, to its immediate improve-ment."

Just how the facts concerning 42A escaped the framers of the gas tax law is still somewhat of a mystery.

Not in Bond Issue Laws

The tax law provides that \$7,500,-000 shall be spent in widening and improving certain radial arteries ex-tending out from Cook county which are in the state bond issue system, numbered from 1 to 185. While Wau-kegan road is designated by the state as route 42A, it is not included as

Estimate Lake County's Share of Gasoline Tax in Excess of \$300,000

Lake county will pay from \$300,-000 to \$330,000 to the state in gaso-line tax each year under the 3 cent gas tax effective Thursday in the opinion of R. M. Lobdell, county sup-erintendent of highways.

One-third of the amount collected will be returned to Lake county to be used for road building and main-tenance purposes.

While application of the tax will not meet with favor in Lake coun-ty, residents of this county will fare better under the tax than those in most other counties in the state for the reason that much of the money to be paid for gasoline in this coun-ty will be expended by visitors.

Lake county with the possible ex-ception of Cook county attracts more visitors from outside its confines than any other county in Illinois. Thou-sands of automobiles come into the county every day, many of them tourists who pass through on impor-tant highways but the most of them headed for lakes in this county. It is estimated that taxes paid by these visitors will represent at least one-third of the total collected in the county.

As a result Lake county will re-ceive many thousands of dollars more than its residents have spent.
