Tentative plans call for the opening of the day's program about 10 o'clock in the morning. There are to be races and novelty contests for children, and adults, too. It is planned to run off some of these races in the morning. The Chamber of Commerce is buying prizes which will be presented to winners of each race.

Each family will bring its own basket lunch, and the frolicking will stop long enough at noon to give everyone ample time to satisfy his hunger.

Following the races in the afternoon the principal attraction will be a ball game between two teams made up of local merchants. The game will start about 3 o'clock.

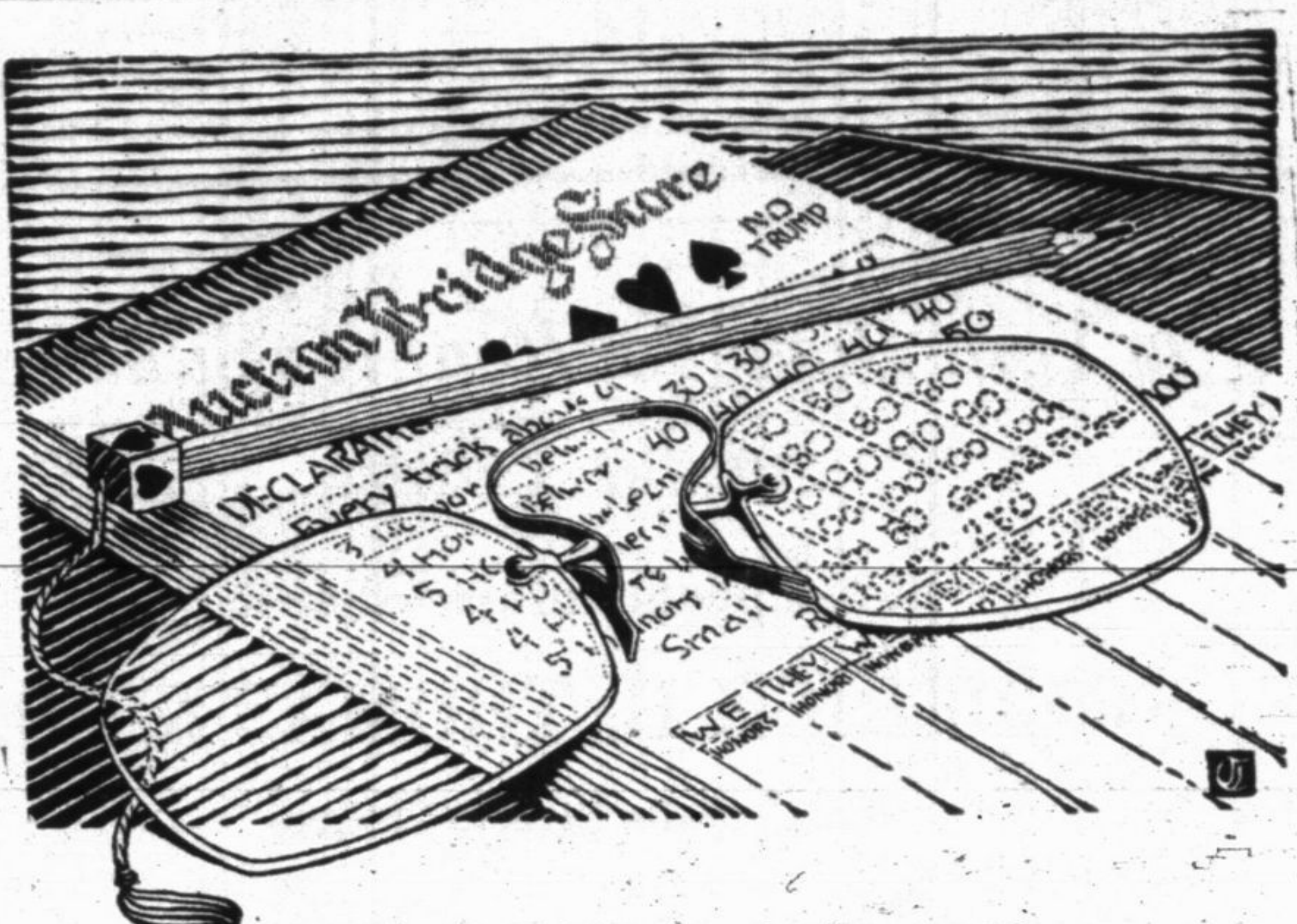
Favors are to be provided for the children, and there will be a merry-go-round and swings on the grounds. Boating and swimming will be available.
