MRS. MCGRAW DIES RESULT OF WOUNDS

Inquest and Hearing Saturday; Burial Held Today at Newtown, Illinois

. The death of Mrs. George McGraw Tuesday afternoon put the investigation of the circumstances surrounding her death into the hands of States Attorney A. V. Smith of Lake county.

Mrs. McGraw was found injured at her home by her husband upon returning from work as a motorman for the North Shore line Sunday morning. She was suffering from the effects of wounds inflicted with an ice pick about the head and a blow from an object such as a hammer or club, and was taken to the Highland Park hospital. It is believed that she died as the result of a brain puncture from a blow with the ice pick.

John Mahoney and G. M. Jones, automobile salesmen who are said to room over the McGraw residence at 114 N. First street, and George Sullivan, a friend of the McGraws for eighteen years and a roomer in their house, are being held by Highland Park police as material witnesses.

Sullivan was charged with the murder Wednesday in a warrant issued before Justice A. E. Smith and signed by Chief of Police Maroney. The bloodstained clothing of Sullivan was sent to Coroner's Chemist Mc-Nally of Cook county for analysis.

According to the theory of the police, a party at the McGraw home Sunday night with Mrs. McGraw and the above three men as participants ended in the violence that led to Mrs. McGraw's death. It is supposed that a ride was followed by drinking and eventually a fight.

A preliminary hearing has been called for 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The coroner's jury was sworn in Wednesday morning and the inquest will be held sometime Saturday, (Continued on page 43)

ONE DEAD, MANY HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENTS

Nicholas Preti Dies from Injuries Sustained in Collision; Paul Lencioni, Recovering

Nicholas Preti, 18 year old boy from Highwood, died at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Wheeling hospital from injuries sustained in an-automobile collision Sunday morning at the intersection of the Dundee and Pfingston roads.

Preti suffered a concussion of the brain, a broken nose, body bruises, and was badly burned about the body from gasoline spilled when the two automobiles turned over. Merle Allen, 18 year old Highland Park boy, was driving the car in which Preti and the two others were riding.

They were driving home from a field day celebration on Dundee road when a car drove from Pfingston road. Both cars turned over. Paul Lencioni, son of Tony Lencioni, Highland Park, received severe cuts and bruises. Sam Ugolini, also of Highland Park, was badly cut. Along with Allen they were picked up by the state police from the Chicago station and taken to the Wheeling hospital, where they have been under the care of Dr. Edward E. Larson.
