The light artillery of second defense was made up of "Dick" O'Connor, "Wee" Pete Harder and "Louie" Bennett, the new third sacker.

The pitching of the game was divided between Ariano and Harder. Ariano allowed the visitors five hits in five innings, while "Wee" Pete allowed only one in four innings. While Ariano was credited with two strike outs, Harder was credited with five. Not a bad day's work.

McLaughlin and Lenzine shared honors in left field, Lenzine relieving McLaughlin in the fourth inning.

Legion Takes Over Old Libertyville Town Hall

Libertyville's old town hall, erected in 1894, and for many years the center of social and civic activities in the township, is to be completely remodeled in an effort to bring back some of its lost prestige as a community center, according to announcement made last week by officers of the Libertyville American Legion post, who have had charge of the building for several years.

The remodeling process will be carried on in stages which, when completed, will transform the old building into a modern community structure, according to Tom De Lacey, commander of the Legion post. The first steps to be taken will be the erection of a veranda across the front of the building, facing Milwaukee avenue, and the renovating of the first floor. It is believed that this work can be completed by Armistice day at which time the building will be thrown open to the public.

It is the plan of the Legion to lower the level of the entrance to the building, so that the veranda and the first floor will be on a level. The roof of the veranda will be supported by white pillars. The flooring will be of concrete and comfortable chairs and benches will be placed on the porch for the use of any who might want to linger there to visit or rest. The remodeling plans take in both the interior and exterior of the building.
