C.M.T.C. STUDENTS GIVEN SCHOLARSHIPS

Lake Forest College Among Those Awarding Free Instruction to Cadets

Many scholarships in educational institutions in the middle west will be awarded to Camp Deiley C.M.T.C. students this week. St. John's Military Academy offers a full year's tuition valued at \$1100.00. Candidates must be high school honor graduates. Second semester scholarship is conditioned upon the student's acquiring scholastic attainment and showing sufficient interest during the first semester and not already attending school at St. Johns.

Lawrence, Ripon and Beloit colleges offer a full year's tuition valued at from \$250 to \$300 to Wisconsin students. Candidates must be graduates of accredited high schools and have determined upon a higher education and be considered satisfactory in ability, character and ambition.

Lake Forest Scholarship

The University of Chicago, DePaul university, Lake Forest college, Wheaton college, Bradley Polytechnic Institute of Peoria offer scholarships which include full tuition for one year amounting to from \$175 to \$300.

The conditions of these scholarships have been read to the entire student body and the candidates will be assembled on Thursday afternoon for further instructions, and final selection will be made the early part of next week.

Many athletic awards are also to be made. A gold football will be awarded the winning football team, a gold basketball to the winning basketball team and numerous other awards for individual honors. 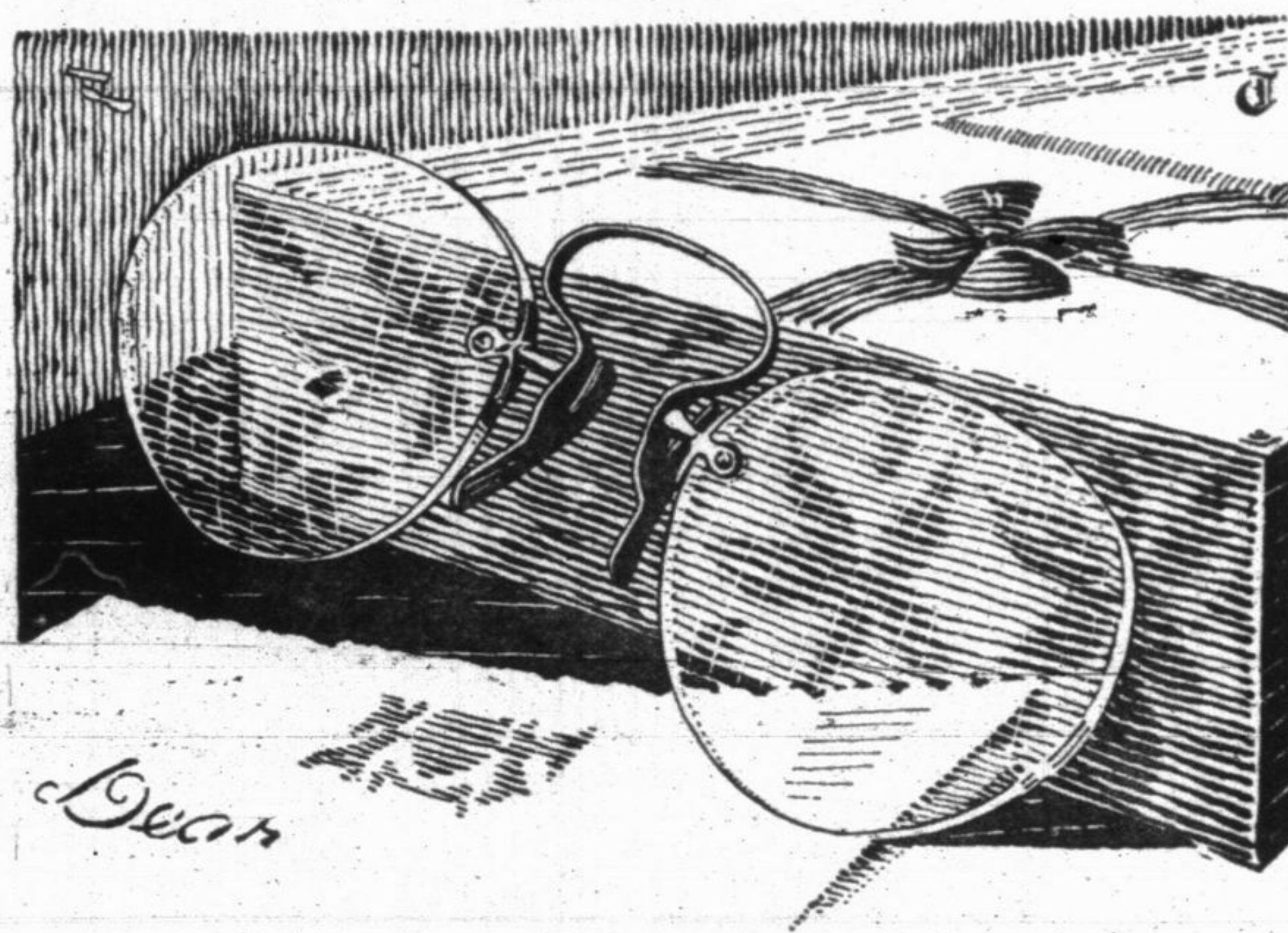
