BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

Happenings in This Neighborhood and at County Seat of Interest Locally

While Sheriff L. A. Doolittle and police along the North Shore were on the lookout for Harry L. Wieder, 50, who eluded police who laid siege to his house on Dundee road near Wheeling after he had attempted to murder one of their number, Wieder returned to Wheeling and surrendered to the authorities there last week.

Wieder, crazed from drinking moonshine, held the police at bay for almost an hour, made his escape into woods surrounding his home and then fled in his automobile into Lake county after the authorities gave up the vigil at his place.

Practically an entire city block in the heart of the Libertyville business district has been purchased by a syndicate of men interested in the development, will run about \$220,000.

The block involved in the deal is bounded by Milwaukee avenue, Church street and Cook avenue. Plans of the syndicate include the construction of a hotel, theatre, stores and other improvements.
