Three Killed in Train Wreck at Wadsworth on Friday Night; Details

Three men were killed and four people injured at 6 o'clock last Friday evening when an express flyer on the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railroad hurtled through an open switch one mile north of Wadsworth and crashed into the locomotive on a 90 car freight train which was standing on a siding waiting for the express to pass.

Lorimer, veteran engineer on the express train, was crushed between the engine cab and the ten ler which was pulled up along side the engine by the impact of the collision and his body could not be extricated until wrecking cranes had moved the demolished tender and acetylene torches had been used to cut through the twisted steel of the debris.
