

H. M. PRIOR DIES AT SUMMER HOME

his father's physician at New Auburn early Tuesday morning saying that Mr. Prior's condition was serious, and the son started north as soon as possible. Not long after he had left a telegram came announcing his father's death.

Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Prior were accustomed to spend much of each summer at their lodge in Wisconsin and

had been there for several weeks this year. As far as known Mr. Prior had been in his usual health and enjoying the outing and especially the fishing, of which sport he was especially fond.

Lived Here 40 Years

Henry M. Prior was about 70 years of age. He was born in Pennsylvania, March 4, 1859, and came as a young man to Evanston, Illinois, where, about 45 years ago, he married Miss Annie Iredale. They settled in Highland Park about 40 years ago and this city has since been their home. For some time Mr. Prior was engaged in the carriage painting busi-

ness and later devoted his time solely to the undertaking business in which he and his son, Percy, continued successfully until five years ago when the management was turned over to H. F. Kelley under the firm name of the H. M. Prior company. Recently Mr. Kelley acquired the business.

Since his retirement Mr. Prior and his wife have spent portions of the winters in Florida and part of the summers in Wisconsin, but Highland Park was always their home and a portion of each year was spent here.

The Family

Mr. Prior is survived by his wife and two sons, Lyman Prior of Jacksonville, Fla., who recently visited here, and Percy Prior of this city. There are five grandchildren, Percy Prior, Jr., and Jean Prior, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Prior, and Wolcott, Betsy and Henry Prior, children of Mr. and Mrs. Lyman Prior. H. M. Prior's only living brother, Christian Prior of Colorado Springs, Colo., is at present visiting in Evanston and there are four sisters, Mrs. Walter Iredale, Mrs. Theresa Schultz and Mrs. Frank Hebblethwaite of Evanston and Mrs. Frank Urban of Bradford, Pa.

Former City Treasurer

Mr. Prior was formerly for several years city treasurer of Highland Park and also served Deerfield township as a member of the board of supervisors for some years. He was a member of A. O. Fay Masonic lodge and for years was a member and actively interested in the progress of the Highland Park Business Men's association, now the Chamber of Commerce. He was held in high regard by all who knew him during his long residence in this city, and he had a

host of warm friends in the community who appreciated his many fine qualities. His sudden death is a shock to the entire community, and the relatives have the profound sympathy of all in their bereavement.

Funeral Here

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 Friday afternoon at the Prior home, 1026 Wade street. Interment will be private.

Herman Denzel pointed out the very poor condition of various streets in Highland Park and suggested that the Chamber of Commerce go on record as instigating the following improvements: Pavement of Oakwood avenue from Lincoln avenue to Laurel avenue; Central avenue from Green Bay road to Deerfield road; First street, from Elm Place to Vine avenue. It was also pointed out that the sidewalk adjoining the latter is in very bad condition, endangering pedestrians.

Suggestion was made that action be taken on the 6 foot unpaved district on Roger Williams avenue, east of the track and on the north side of the street. This area is impassable in adverse weather.

A. E. Vetter moved that flags be put out in the business district on October 21st in honor of the golden jubilee of the electric light, and President Udell appointed A. E. Vetter and G. K. Hardacre to procure data and a speaker in this connection for the next meeting, September 10th.

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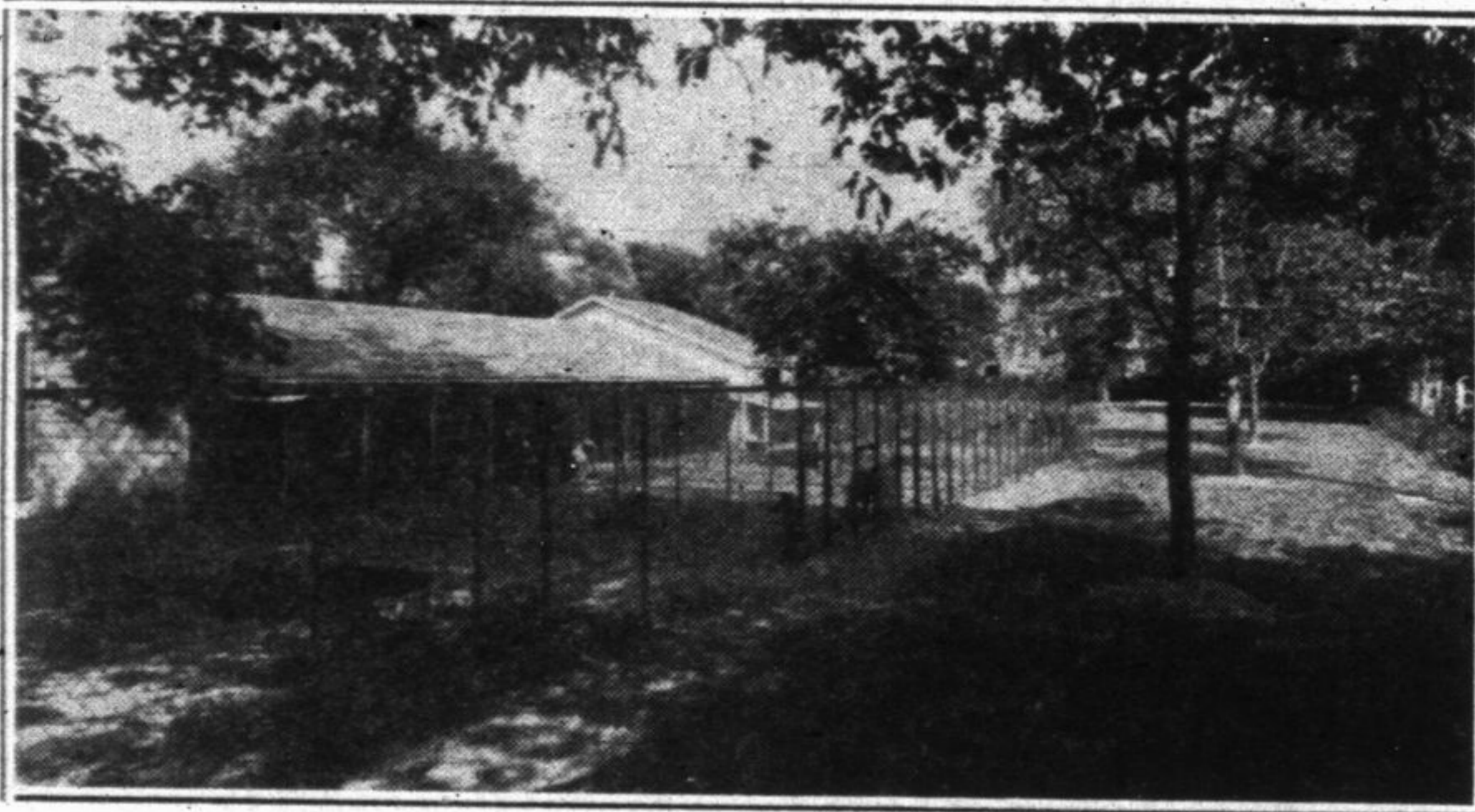
