Broadview avenue and south of Clayvey road. While the south section is under construction it is probable that it will be necessary to detour traffic to the east side of the railways.

Notable Improvement

The award of this contract assures a long-needed improvement and its completion will afford marked improvement in traffic facilities southward, as the section in question has been in bad condition for a long time and this has greatly hampered the passage of motor vehicles.

With the South Green Bay pavement once in there will be a straight-away paved road of good width from Highland Park south, affording easy access in that direction to suburbs to the south and also a direct route to Chicago over modern hard roads; and this will serve to relieve somewhat the traffic on Sheridan road, it is expected.

Central Avenue Next?

As has been previously suggested in the Press, this good work should not be allowed to lag. Now that Green Bay road north and south is taken care of, attention should be directed to Central avenue west, with a view to early widening and repaving of the section between Green Bay road and the Deerfield road pavement. This is much needed, and the Press feels sure that action by the city authorities in that direction will be welcomed by everybody who has occasion to use this thoroughfare.

After tapping the stone into position, Mayor Lewis handed the tools to the architect, Frederic Hodgdon, speaking as follows:

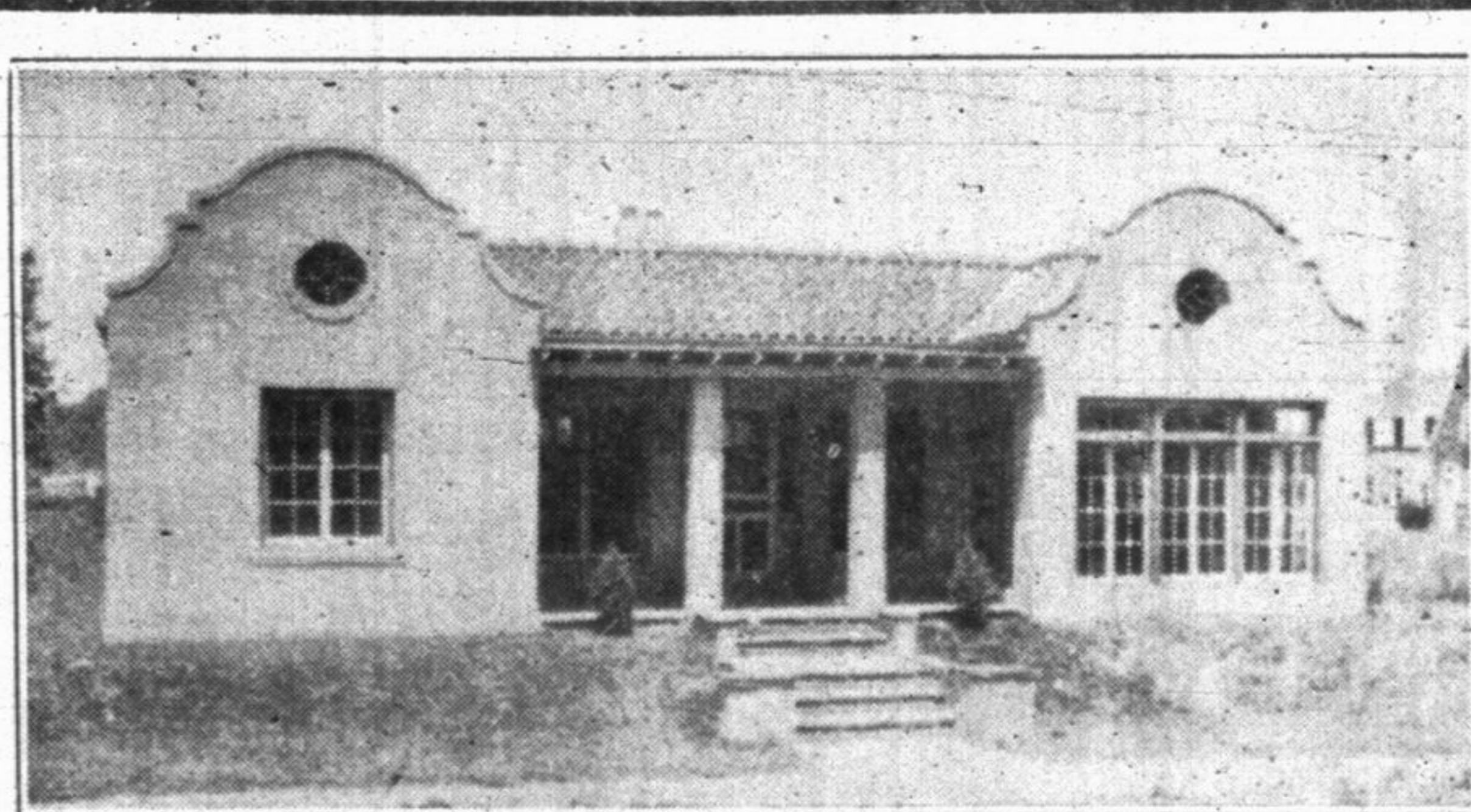
Mayor's Address

"I have tried and proved this stone by plumb, square and level and pronounce it to be well formed, true and trusty.

"Mr. Hodgdon, having thus, as Mayor of Highland Park, laid the foundation stone of this structure, I now deliver these implements of your profession into your hands, intrusting you with the superintendence and direction of the work, having full confidence in your skill and capacity to conduct the same.

"In selecting the site for this building the members of your administration have had the hope that it will mark the beginning of a civic center that will be beautified and maintained as a park. To the north of this building will be constructed a beautiful public library and if the interest manifested here today is continued, these grounds need not ever want for beauty.

"We hope we are inaugurating an improvement which our children will carry on and make even more beautiful and that these grounds will always prove an inspiration to those occupying these buildings.
