

WELL KNOWN ARTIST AND ARCHITECT DIES

Lawrence Buck, Resident of Ravinia 19 Years Victim of Heart Trouble

Lawrence Buck, artist and architect, died suddenly Saturday morning at his home in Ravinia of a heart ailment from which he had suffered for several years.

Of distinguished French and Norwegian ancestry, Mr. Buck was born in New Orleans in 1866. He came to Chicago thirty years ago and had made his home in Ravinia for nineteen years. He was recognized all over the country as a specialist in architectural renderings and as a master in perspective and design. Until about six years ago he maintained a studio in Chicago, but since that time he has done all his work in his home. In spite of his physical handicap he was active until the end.

He was a producing member of the Arts club and the North Shore Art league and a leader of the Ravinia Sketch group. He was a charter member of the Ravinia Commission and served a term of five years as a member of the East Park board of Highland Park. He was an active member of the Allendale association. Examples of his beautiful work are to be found in all the North Shore towns and in the middle west generally.

Mr. Buck was of a retiring disposition and an exponent of the simple life. He chose Ravinia as his home because of its artistic and beautiful setting for the kind of life he wanted to live. A music lover, he was attracted also by the proximity to Ravinia Park in the days when Damarosch conducted the orchestra programs there.

Civic Interests

He was always keenly interested in civic affairs and gave most generously of his time and skill to anything which was for the general good of the community. This was particularly true of the Ravinia Park programs there.

Two Viaducts Being Widened by Railroad

Widening of the Moraine road viaduct just off Green Bay road and also of the Sheridan place viaduct, just east of St. Johns avenue, is being pushed by the Northwestern railroad work-train gang, in accordance with an agreement made some time ago between the city and the railroad. The work train may be on the job for two or three months, according to local agent E. C. Ohrmund, as the work must necessarily be slow owing to the fact that no interference in the passage of trains is to be permitted. Hence, in order to prosecute the work as fast as possible the force of men with the train worked all last Sunday and probably will continue this plan. The widening of these two narrow viaducts will be a great convenience to traffic and also an additional safeguard against accidents.
